BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

A massive oak tree, 326 years old, has been cut down on the Whitaker farm, in Polk county. The tree was 19 feet in circumference.

Dr. B. C. Olinger of The Dalles has been appointed deputy grand exalted ruler of the Elks lodge for the northern Oregon district.

Oregon City and Milwaukie are in the thick of a "dry" election. Petitions have been filed calling for an election November 4.

Electors of The Dalles will vote on November 4 to decide whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited.

Pupils of the schools of Polk county will study dairying. W. A. Barr of the Oregon Agricultural college is working out the details of the work.

The Byers flour mill, or properly speaking, the Pendleton Roller Mills, has been sold to a Holland syndicate, represented by L. C. Lens, manager of the Spokane Flour Mills.

Alberta Dillon, owned by Joe Carson of Winnipeg, Manitoba, won the Lewis and Clark stake from 13 starters, making the third heat in 2:10, at the state fair at Salem.

Under the income tax feature of the Underwood tariff bill Oregon will contribute at least a quarter of a million dollars annually to the revenues of the United States.

There is liable to be considerable controversy over the recent cruise of the timber lands in Clatsop county, made by the Neaz Timber company, under contract with the county court.

Business men of Oregon City are looking into the plan of quitting the use of Bull Run water and obtaining a new supply from the south fork of the Clackamas river.

More than 300,000 acres of land in Crook county, near La Pine, declared more valuable for agricultural than forestry purposes, soon will be opened for settlement on the lottery plan.

Dr. Bailey K. Leach, who was deported because of alleged anarchistic statements at Coos Bay, has left for Astoria to deliver lectures on socialism.

Miss Lottie L. Fleet, who has been librarian at Pendleton three years, has resigned to accept the position of assistant librarian of the public library at Portland.

When an auto in which they were riding turned turtle at Dallas, George Krebs, Ross Nelson, Genevieve Wilcox and Bertha Potterfield received slight injuries.

Hundreds of dead female China pheasants were left in the fields of Linn county, as result of the slaughter on the first day of the open season, it is said.

A longer compulsory school term and a larger general school fund were recommended at a conference held under the auspices of the University of Oregon and members of several educational leagues, at Salem.

The first fair ever held at Tygh, southern Wasco county, has just closed. The fair was a success in every way, exhibits of fruits, vegetables, horses, sheep and swine being of special merit.

Mrs. H. C. Foster, formerly Miss Hattie Long of Pendleton, a bride of less than a month, has secured a warrant for the arrest of her husband at San Francisco, charging him with disappearing with \$1000 which had been given into his care.

Secretary Houston has advised Representative Sinnott that he recommended the elimination of 24,000 acres from the Deschutes national forest. Approval by the secretary of the interior is needed to complete the elimination.

Under the terms of Senator Lane's amendment to the tariff bill every American farmer, if so disposed, can enter on the manufacture of denatured alcohol after securing a permit from the commissioner of internal revenue in the treasury department.

There promises to be a lively campaign in Marshfield to bring about reform movements. While the "wet" and "dry" question cannot be brought up for some time, those who favor prohibition and reforms are working hard to get all their followers registered for the next city election.

Sheepmen in eastern Oregon are facing a serious problem in what to do for feed for their sheep when they bring them in from the summer range in the mountains, as this summer and fall has been exceptionally dry, and there is practically no grass on the home range.

The senate has agreed to Senator Lane's amendment to the deficiency bill authorizing the use of the appropriation for the Portland postoffice in the erection of a general office building sufficiently large to accommodate the postoffice and other federal offices in Portland that now occupy rented quarters.

Judge Percy R. Kelly of the Marion county circuit court sustained the demurrer of the complaint filed by Attorney General Crawford, on behalf of the state against Governor West, Secretary of State Olcott and State Treasurer Kay, to recover practically \$18,000 alleged to have been unlawfully expended from the penitentiary revolving fund.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

Heavy snow fall in the Sumpter district, and traffic and telephone lines have been hampered.

Mrs. Sarah A. Evans was re-elected president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs at the convention at Hood River.

Since the establishment of the state automobile registration department in 1911, Multnomah county has paid in more than \$26,000 in fees.

Owing to effective forest patrol Linn county passed through the summer without a single destructive forest fire.

Three carloads of horses have been bought in upper Malheur section by the government for use in the war department.

Glendale and Sutherlin will not vote on local option issues November 4 because of technicalities in the petitions.

Governor West had no right to incur debt in carrying on vice crusade work, and the emergency board had no authority to declare legal such action, according to the attorney-general.

L. D. Westfall of Tualatin won the handsome loving cup offered by the Great Northern railroad for the best agricultural exhibit at the state fair at Salem.

More than 30,000 head of sheep will leave Bend for Chicago stock yards, this probably being the largest single shipment of mutton ever made from Oregon.

Eugene was chosen as the next place of meeting at the closing session of the annual convention of the State Federation of Women's Clubs at Hood River.

High school officials of Coquille have placed a ban on pupils' attending picture shows, parties, dances, etc., on any night in the week except on Friday and Saturday.

George Temple, aged 12, a Chemawa student, shot Watchman George Staniff. The latter hit the boy on the head with the former's weapon. Both may die.

The Noti tunnel on the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad is nearly ready for the rails. Trains may be run from Eugene to Mapleton within the next 80 days.

School fund loans in Oregon aggregating \$100,000 may be forfeited unless the notes are renewed or foreclosure suits are brought, says Governor West.

Representative Humphrey of Washington may visit some of the more important river and harbor projects in Oregon if Representative Hawley finds he can't make the trip.

The C. A. Smith lumber company has been asked by Governor West of Oregon to defend its title to 10,000 acres of land which, it is intimated, has been obtained by use of dummy school land selections.

Guy M. Lindsay, former cashier of the Citizens National bank of Baker City, was freed of the charge of misappropriating funds, because of the government's failure to produce any damaging evidence against him.

George H. George, president of the Astoria National bank, vice president, secretary and treasurer of the Columbia River Packers' association and one of the foremost citizens of Oregon, died at his home in Astoria.

That the national forest, which recently was opened to homesteading of available agricultural lands, is on the brink of an era of development is the opinion of J. Roy Harvey, newly appointed supervisor.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels has informed Senator Chamberlain that insufficient room on the battleship Oregon will prevent Oregon guardsmen from accompanying the ship through the Panama canal, as an escort.

Suit has been filed by the attorney general of Oregon against the governor, secretary of state and treasurer, for recovery of \$14,000 said to have been unlawfully spent out of the penitentiary revolving fund.

Senator Chamberlain has been told by the state department that the proposed legislation by Chile has been changed to make the lumber duty 70 per cent ad valorem, an increase of 50 per cent, instead of 215 per cent as intended.

Governor West intends to put the payment of expense of grand jury investigation of I. W. W. deportation in Coos county up to A. H. Powers, of the Smith-Powers Logging company. Powers is blamed for instigating the deportation.

Very largely through the efforts of Representative Sinnott, the director of the geological survey has recommended to the secretary of the interior designation under the enlarged homestead act of sections 7, 8, 16, 23, to 36, township 26 south, range 16 east; sections 1, 2, 11 to 14, 23 to 26, 35, 36, township 27, range 16 east, Lake county, near Fort Rock.

Governor West has appointed a committee to devise a plan for an improved system of forest taxation. The governor also will urge the committee to formulate a plan to encourage reforestation and the settlement of logged-off lands and to make recommendations to the next legislature.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS
(Official Publication.)

Oct. 6, 1913.—Council met in regular session.

Ordinance 389, being an ordinance awarding the contract for the steel bridge across the Coast Fork on Main Street was read first, second and third times, passed and signed by the mayor.

A report from the Ambrose-Burdal Co. on the work at the rock quarry to October 1, 1913, was read showing the rock taken from the quarry and crushed during the year to be 9624 cubic yards. The report for the use of the steam roller for 504 hours on the street work was read. The engineer's report on the street contracts of the Ambrose-Burdal Co. was read showing the amount earned to date on the contracts to be \$21,841.95, on which \$12,090.83 has been paid, leaving a balance due of \$9751.12. On motion this amount less 10 per cent of the entire contract price, amounting to \$2184.19, leaving a balance of \$7566.93, was ordered paid when Ambrose-Burdal Co. delivers to the city its check for 15c per cubic yard for amount of rock crushed and pay for use of steam roller, street sprinkler and use of water for their work during the season.

The report on the rock quarry, the use of the steam roller and water was referred to the city engineer to be checked over and final adjustment made thereon with the contractors. On motion the street committee was authorized to adjust the matter of rock crushed and left over from last year and used this year by the Ambrose-Burdal Co.

On motion a 32-candle-power incandescent light was ordered placed at the northwest corner of North Seventh Street and Woods avenue.

On motion the matter of locating the line of the new steel bridge on Main Street and disposing of the King building was referred to bridge committee with power to act.
