BECAUSE he compiled the love letters for a Swedish friend of his who couldn't write, L. A. Messing of Cates, Oregon, became entangled in a matrimonial alliance from which he was legally released in the state circuit court at Albany last week.

Messing was conducting a combination jewelry store and photograph gallery at Phoenix, Oregon, at the time of his matrimonial adventure, he testified. The Swede in the case was desirous of securing a wife by the advertisement method and corresponded with several women, Messing doing the writing for him. Messing testified that he wanted a wife too, and as he was "bashful and did not know how to woo" he decided to try the same method. So he wrote to one of the women on the Swede's matrimonial correspondence list.

"She wrote a good letter and was a good-looking and I thought she would make a good wife," Messing told the court. So after some correspondence they met at Grants Pass on July 29, 1908 and were married. The mail order wife, however, smoked habitually and got drunk on frequent occasions. Hence the suit for a divorce.

"If I grant you a divorce will you go and advertise for another wife?" Judge Galloway asked him.
