STATE ASSOCIATION HONORS GROVE NEWSPAPER

Editors Royally Entertained by Portland Hosts.

Practical Talks by Practical Men on Practical Subjects at Most Profitable Convention in History of State

(Continued from first page.) Hon. Colvin B. Brown, of California, who was in the city chaperoning the Portola girls, proved a highly entertaining speaker for the great exposition. Elbert Bede, editor of The Sentinel,

had as his subject, "How Editors Eat," showing the connection between the gastronomical organs and profitable advertising.

Friday evening was devoted to starting a movement for a Homer Davenport memorial, the guests being entertained at intervals with music by the famous Silverton band, of which the great cartoonist was once a member, and which was made famous in his writings. Three of those who played with Homer are still members of the organization, which is now recognized the peer of any like aggregation of its size in the state.

C. S. Jackson, publisher of the Oregon Journal, the originator of the Davenport Memorial movement delivered the principal address. Col. E. Hofer of Salem, President John H. Stevenson of the Portland Press club, H. E. Hodges, publisher of the Silverton Appeal, ex-Governor Geer and L. Samuels spoke reminiscences and otherwise of the late famous son of Oregon.

In his able address Saturday afternoon on "How to Make a Practical Success of Daily and Weekly Journalism," Col. E. Hofer, retiring president, pointed out many pitfalls that had been discovered

by him during thirty-five years of successful experience. It was full of meat that could not be thoroughly assimilated except through a careful study of the address in print. He described the program newspaper as the only one that could make a lasting impression or hope for more than mediocre success. He took occasion to pay the Cottage Grove Sentinel several neat compliments. He characterized his talk as his farewell address to the association.

W. D. B. Dodson, Trade Commissioner Portland Chamber of Commerce, delivered a well received address with his subject, "A Mutual Problem to be Solved."

At the banquet given by the manufacturers' association the new president spoke upon "Community Co-operation," Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, Oregon's grand old woman, electrified the audience with her reminiscences so quaintly mixed with humor, Mrs. Edyth Tozier Weathered showed what Oregon women are doing and have done in the progress of the state. R. C. Darnell, of the Union Meat company gave the stupendous figures of live stock opportunities in the

state. Colvin B. Brown again spoke for the Panama Exposition, ex-Senator Jonathan Bourne briefly outlined his good roads program and C. S. Jackson made a happy hit with "What the Rest Forgot." Frank B. Riley, vice-president of the Pacific Highway Commission, was second only to Mrs. Duniway in the hit he made with the audience. He gave a graphic description of some of the roads that are not doing anything to help the progress of the state.
