**OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST**

**Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.**

**Water to Be Lowered.**  
Klamath Falls.—According to a letter received by President Mason of the Lower Klamath Marsh Land Owners' association, from Representative Sinnott, officials of the reclamation service are drafting a form of bond, upon the signing of which instrument the government will close the gates at the railroad track, shutting the water of Klamath straits out of Lower Klamath lake, which will allow the reclamation of much marsh land around the lake by lowering the water level. The bond is to insure the government against any damage actions that might arise, and to protect the government against any damage to the water right of the Van Brimmer ditch.

**"Wets" and "Drys" Wage Campaign.**  
Salem.—The most strenuous wet and dry campaign ever carried on in Salem is now being waged. Both sides are well organized and until 10 days ago it was conceded even by the saloon interests that the city would be voted dry on November 4, but within the last week the wets have perfected their organization and now declare they will win the election. It is generally conceded that the result of the election rests largely with the women, and both sides are centering their campaign on them. The last time the issue was presented in Salem, with only the men voting, the city remained wet by a very small majority.

**Eight-Hour Law to Be Tested.**  
Salem.—The state board of control has requested Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff to bring suit against the board to test the question of whether the eight-hour law applies to the employees at state institutions. If the courts should hold that it does apply to the institutions, it is stated that no one of the institutions would have sufficient appropriation to carry it through next year without a deficiency. The governor has said that it might be necessary even to call a special session of the legislature to provide for the emergency.

**GIRL HAS GOOD ROAD PLAN**  
Fair Supervisor of Schools to Let the Pupils Build Highway.  
Eugene.—Road-building, a course of study for the rural schools of western Lane county, is to be introduced within a few days by Miss Goldie Van Biber, school supervisor in the Sluslaw district. Instructions have been mailed. This is the first experiment of its kind ever tried in Oregon. Actual road-building is the laboratory work which will accompany this course. The children of each district will build and maintain during the approaching rainy season a strip of county road near the school building. The school whose road stands the winter and is found in the best condition will be the winner of a unique contest in which school children on the Sluslaw eagerly are awaiting to participate.

**County Judge Helms W. Thompson, Lane county's most active good roads enthusiast, was so pleased with this woman's plan to teach the fundamentals of road building in the rural schools that he immediately offered two huge silver cups as prizes for this good roads contest.**

**One Dead, One Hurt in Wreck.**  
Baker.—One man was killed outright, another was slightly injured and two valuable race horses were hurt in a wreck six miles north of Prairie City on the Sumpter Valley railroad. Robert S. Richardson of Baker was killed when he jumped from an overturning car which fell on him, and William Hall of John Day was injured.

**Has Vision of Railroad.**  
Klamath Falls.—There is every indication that the railroad from this city to Merrill and from there to Fernly, Nev., will be built next summer. There is also evidence that the road to the north will be built to connect with the Hill line coming south and that both Harriman and Hill interests will use the same line for the heavy exposition travel.

**Recall Nominees in Fight to Stay.**  
Hood River.—All the candidates nominated by the recall petitioners have signified their intentions of qualifying and making the race against the members of the present county court at the November election.

**Equalization Board Meets.**  
Salem.—The state board of equalization began holding hearings Friday, when representatives of the large rail road companies appeared before the board.

**BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON**

Medford is planning to entertain the Chicago White Sox and New York Giants teams and officials on their visit to that city, November 17.

Grant county is out of debt and has a balance of \$20,000. Crop yield was big and first class and large sales of cattle at top prices were made.

The first shipment of foreign meats to the Portland market has been received. A carload of Australian beef has been brought into that market by the Union Meat company of Portland.

Grants Pass, by vote of the people, authorized issue of \$200,000 railroad bonds for building first 10-mile unit of the Grants Pass-Crescent City line to the coast.

If county sealers of weights and measures carry into effect the new law, every weight and measure used in commercial pursuits will have to undergo a test.

The voting power in the Umatilla drainage district will be based on the amount of land owned, one vote being allowed to each dollar or major fraction thereof.

Dairy products were discussed this week at Tillamook, when the Oregon Butter and Cheesemakers and the Oregon Dairymen's associations met in joint annual convention.

The Umpqua port organization has requested Secretary Lane to arrange to have a preliminary survey made of the Umpqua bar and river with a view to obtaining appropriations for improving navigation conditions.

Farmers living near Ashland are making money selling goat meat at from 9 to 11 cents a pound. The meat helps solve the high cost of living problem. The money received from the mohair is also a considerable item.

Attorney General Crawford has rendered an opinion to the effect that an osteopath is ineligible to hold office as public health officer. The decision affects Dr. J. A. Van Brakle, acting health officer of Clackamas county.

From 38 opinions in suits of personal injuries handed down by the supreme court in 41 weeks maimed workmen or their widows and orphans received less than 16 per cent of amount asked, under employers' liability act.

The chief of engineers wrote Senator Chamberlain saying \$1,000,000 would be asked next year for the Columbia bar improvements under a continuing contract, and advocating more pumps on the dredge Chinook.

It has been definitely decided that La Grande's new form of city government shall not be ordered into effect until January 1, instead of at once, as was thought necessary under the charter.

Sent to light a fire on the Hallowell ranch near Oregon City, Charles Neimberg, aged 36 years, blew the top of his head off with a shotgun and his body was found by members of the family.

Supreme court rules that if man who takes orders in the state and fills them from orders from another state, he is an agent, but if he fills orders from stock on hand he is a peddler, and therefore must pay a license.

The mystery of the discovery of 200 sticks of dynamite in the canal near the court house at Klamath Falls has been explained. Contractors had thrown the explosives away over a year ago, after completing sewer work.

A seagoing dredge will be sent from the Atlantic coast for use in the Columbia river channel, just as soon as the Panama canal is opened, according to information received by Dr. Kinney, chairman of the Ports of Columbia committee.

Senator Lane, after a competitive examination, has appointed Wilson E. Zimmerman of Portland as midshipman at Annapolis Naval academy, naming Lawrence Schepky of Hood River as alternate. If Zimmerman fails to pass the entrance examination, Schepky will have a chance.

Governor West has written the editor of the Coos Bay Times of Marshfield for advice on suing the C. A. Smith Lumber company for school lands which may have been obtained by fraudulent means. The newspaper has been attacking the governor's policy.

Governor West has referred to United States District Attorney Reames of Portland for investigation, a letter received from C. A. Rold of Yontaville, Cal., in which Rold says a company called the Farm and Home company of San Francisco, is representing to him that it will locate him on a 320-acre homestead in southern Oregon for a fee of \$320.

Senator Chamberlain presented Miss Fern Hobbs, secretary to Governor West, to Assistant Secretary of the Interior Jones and to Land Commissioner Talman, in order that she might bring up questions of the Oregon indemnity school land selections on which patents have not yet been issued. Miss Hobbs and Secretary Chamberlain had a conference with Representative Hawley regarding the Chamberlain bill, providing for an exchange of school lands in forest reserves and the creation of a state forest reserve.

**NO CHOICE IN THE MEXICAN ELECTION**

**Insufficient Votes Cast to Constitute Legal Successor to President Huerta.**

Mexico City.—At the close of the Mexican election indications were that not sufficient votes had been cast to constitute a legal choice for the presidency to succeed General Victoriano Huerta.

It was estimated, judging from the results in the capital, where it was expected the vote would be up to the average, that fewer than 10,000 of the 80,000 eligible voters in the federal district went to the polls. There are about 3,000,000 eligible voters in the entire republic. It would be no surprise if congress, the members of which also were voted for, declared the election void when the body is organized and revises the returns.

The leaders of the Catholic party claimed a long lead for their candidates, Frederico Gamboa and General Rascon. If this claim is correct, it is generally thought that General Felix Diaz and Senor Requena ran second.

There was no disorder in Mexico City. The polling places opened at 9. The election officials appeared to be a representative class of citizens. So far as could be ascertained, no government employes served in that capacity.

**Diaz Severs Last Tie With Huerta.**

Vera Cruz.—The last shred binding General Felix Diaz and General Victoriano Huerta was severed when General Diaz telegraphed to the department of war his resignation as brigadier-general of the army. It was announced later that the general resignation had been demanded by the war department at the capitol.

**REDEDICATE CONGRESS HALL**

President Wilson Occupies the Historic Chair Used by John Hancock.

Philadelphia.—Congress hall, in historic Independence square, where the senate and house of representatives sat from 1790 to 1800, was rededicated with patriotic exercises, the occasion marking the completion of the restoration of the hall to almost its original appearance.

President Wilson was the central figure in the ceremonies and delivered a 20-minute address.

The president was the last speaker. He sat in the high-backed chair which was used by John Hancock when he presided over the continental congress. In front of him was the age-stained flat top desk used in signing the Declaration of Independence.

**CHURCH QUESTIONS REMAIN UNSETTLED**

New York.—The general convention of 1913 of the Protestant Episcopal church passed into history in hopeless deadlock on two important resolutions, with the most far-reaching topic of legislation before it unconsidered by one house because of an error in the other, and with a positive refusal to consider a request of the Women's Christian Temperance union that unfermented grape juice be substituted for wine in the communion service.

On the proposal to establish a separate bishopric for negroes in the south and on the proposed elimination of the words "Jews, Turks, infidels and heretics," the house of bishops and the house of deputies were deadlocked.

On the proposal to require a two-thirds vote to change the name of the church, adopted by the deputies, the bishops refused to act because the resolution was sent to them only the day before adjournment, while it was adopted by the lower house more than two weeks ago. The original draft of the resolution was mislaid.

**Pullman College Team Defeated.**

Portland.—Three thousand football enthusiasts saw the Multnomah club defeat Washington state college on Winged "M" field, 7 to 0. Multnomah won because a bad punt by Captain Coulter gave the clubmen the ball on Pullman's 30-yard line early in the fourth quarter.

**Oregon Wins, 27-0, Over Idaho.**

Eugene.—By a score of 27 to 0, Oregon eliminated Idaho from the race for the conference football championship on Kincaid field this afternoon. Touchdowns by Malarkey, Fenton and Cornell, all of which were converted into goals by Fenton, and two goals from placement by Fenton, went into the making of Oregon's score.

**Aggies Unable to Score at Seattle.**

Seattle.—The University of Washington football team defeated Oregon Agricultural college by a score of 4 to 0 on Denny field here today and added one more game to the unbroken victorious record that has lasted five years and is beginning a sixth.

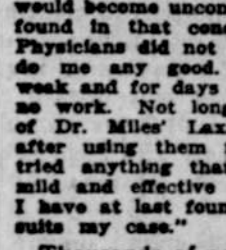
