Out of nearly 200 Oregon newspaper men, 27 attended the annual state press association meeting at Portland recently. This organization is a state press association in name only.

THE ABOVE is a clipping from a competitor of The Sentinel, and is about as pretty an exhibition of inane jealousy as one could wish to see, although hardly edifying.

The Sentinel cares not on its own account anything about the offspring of a contemporary who can not bear to see The Sentinel gather any laurels. It does not hurt us personally to have our competitor knock the Commercial Club just because the editor of The Sentinel happens for the moment to be its secretary. We do not care a whit if its jealousy so far makes it forget its duty to its reader that it will not admit to its columns any news in which it would be compelled to mention the editor of The Sentinel. It does not hurt us in the least to have our contemporary empty its gall bladder upon the Willamette Press Association and the State Editorial Association for the only reason that the editor of The Sentinel happens for the time being to be an officer therein.

But we do think that the character of such attacks calls for a little gentle advice from us, and here it is:

Never show jealousy of your competitor. It doesn't hurt him, only furnishes amusement for others, and is very bad for the complexion.

Don't vent your spite upon an organization just because your competitor happens to be an officer thereof. Such action only displays a narrowness that may lead into a tight place. Besides you can do little acting like a skye terrier endeavoring to intimidate a Newfoundland.

Be careful about giving figures concerning something you know not of, lest you be found guilty of inaccuracy. To illustrate: You say 27 attended the recent editorial convention. The St. Helens Mist, whose editor was present, says over a hundred editors were there. You should not juggle facts even in giving vent to jealousy of a competitor. To illustrate: You say the State Editorial Association is a state organization in name only. Yet the secretary reports half the country newspapers of the state as members, which includes most of the live ones, your name not being in the list.

If you haven't gumption and backbone enough to try to do something for yourself, don't belittle the efforts of those who are doing things. It is this spirit which is holding back Cottage Grove, it is the same spirit which is holding back our great state. That is a poor part for a newspaper to play. Of course there must be a few yelpers to attract attention to those who are doing things, but we had hoped that you would not be one of these. You seem to think the membership of the State Editorial Association is not large enough. That's easily changed. Come across with two plunks. If all the editors of the state showed the spirit you exhibit in the article quoted the state association would have no members. But at least half the newspapers of the state have live editors and that's why the state association can boast of having an organization that well nigh upsets for the time being the social and business conditions of Portland when a convention is held there. (So far as we know no other organization has been given three banquets during a two days' session there.)

Quit yelping. Join the Commercial Club, the editorial associations and other things. Don't stand out in the cold and rain and whine. Get inside where you can do things. Don't be a baby any longer. Take a man's part. Rub elbows with the boys and get some of the bile out of your system. It'll do you good. You'll broaden out. You'll see things in a different light.

We will be pleased to propose your name to several organizations. We offer this kindly advice in a spirit of real sympathy and with an earnest desire to help. We trust it may be so accepted.

Pledges have already been secured for several hundred dollars and it is expected that the sum will reach an amount large enough to erect some memorial worthy of the gentle friend of man and beast cut down almost in the prime of life. It is expected that small donations will be made by nearly every newspaper in Oregon. The newspapers are authorized to receive subscriptions to the fund.

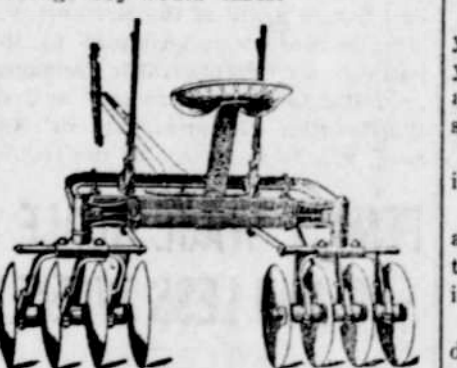
