OREGON RESOURCES UNDER INVESTIGATION

United States Geological Survey
Making Topographic Maps in
Various Parts of State.

So many of the industries of Oregon are directly related to the development of the state's mineral resources or

water resources that the work of the United States Geological Survey is always of special importance in this state. Oregon, in common with other public land states, is receiving a much larger share of attention from the federal survey than the older states of the east, largely because of the need of information for the classification of the public lands.

In accordance with arrangements for cooperating with State Bureau of Geology and Mines, work was begun in June by a party in charge of A. J. Collier in the reconnaissance exploration of the John Day valley, in the northern part of the state, where from time to time the residents have reported hopeful indications of the occurrence of coal and oil. The study of the detailed stratigraphy and economic geology of the Sumpter quadrangle, west of Baker City, nearly half of which had previously been mapped by J. T. Pardee of the federal survey, will be completed under cooperative auspices by F. J. Katz for folio description and publication.

The lands in the Klamath Indian Reservation are being classified by H. G. Ferguson for the office of Indian Affairs, and the geologic mapping and classification of the coal-bearing areas including Eden Ridge in the western part of the state will be accomplished for the land office by C. Lesher.

Six New Topographic Maps in Progress.

In cooperation with the state engineer of Oregon, the topographic branch of the survey is this season engaged in making maps of the areas known as the Salem, Albany, Aumsville and Corvallis quadrangles, in the Willamette valley. These are 15-minute quadrangles, each covering an area of approximately 212 square miles. Mapping of the Condon 30-minute quadrangle, in Gilliam and Sherman counties, with an approximate area of 842 square miles, is also in progress. A large amount of triangulation work, to establish the control of other areas to be surveyed, is also in progress. This surveying is being done by Topographers C. H. Birdseye, W. O. Tufts, J. H. Wheat, G. G. Taylor, S. E. Taylor, S. G. Lund, W. S. Johnson and F. W. Crisp. Plan and profile surveys of the Middle and McKenzie forks of Willamette River and of Santiam, Clackamas and Sandy rivers are also in progress by Topographers L. F. Biggs and D. S. Birkett.

The work will include the detailed surveys necessary to prepare a map which will show all rivers, towns, roads and railroads, as well as the surface relief of the country by means of 5 and 100 foot contour lines. The completed maps will be engraved on scales of 1 and 2 miles to 1 inch, and the river profile will be reproduced on the scale of half a mile to 1 inch. The maps will probably not be ready for distribution until about two years after the completion of the field work, but the river profiles, reproduced by the photolithographic process, will be available next spring.

Investigation of Water Resources.

The water resources branch of the Geological Survey, in cooperation with the state and others, is investigating the water resources in the various portions of Oregon. For this purpose 110 gauging stations are maintained in the state, ten of which are in the Great Basin, 8 in Pacific coast and California drainage basins, and 92 in the Columbia River Basin. Seven of these stations are maintained by the federal survey alone, 28 in cooperation with the state of Oregon, and the rest in cooperation with other federal bureaus, municipalities and private persons. At these gauging stations the height or stage of the rivers is determined each day by local observers and at some stations by automatic gauges, and measurements of the discharge of the streams are made by engineers of the survey. From these data the quantity of water flowing past the stations is determined. Stream flow records are of particular value in Oregon in the design, construction and maintenance of water power plants and irrigation projects, in investigations for the classification of the public lands, and in Carey Act examinations. The records also find wide use in the state in all problems where the quantity of water is involved, such as those relating to water storage, seepage, river

regulation, land drainage, stream pollution and municipal water supplies. Such records are also of great value for general statistical and comparative purposes.

The investigations of surface water by the United Geological Survey in central and western Oregon are carried on by F. F. Henshaw, district engineer, E. S. Fuller and John E. Stewart, with offices at 416 Couch Building, Portland, Ore., and those in eastern Oregon by G. C. Baldwin, district engineer, A. B. Purton and A. C. Pierce, with offices at 615-617 Idaho Building, Boise, Idaho. The cooperating State official is John H. Lewis, state engineer, Salem, Ore.

Examinations, investigations, and reports needed by the land classification board of the Geological Survey in passing on right of way applications, water-power withdrawals, and Carey Act segregations, together with examinations of land for designation under the enlarged homestead act involving the use of water in Oregon, are being made by E. C. LaPue, hydraulic engineer, Federal Building, Salt Lake City, Utah, and E. C. Murphy, hydraulic engineer, Napa, Cal.

CLOVER SEED MAKES HIGH PRICED DUCK BAIT

Editor and Friends Go to Unexpected Expense in Raising Table Delicacy.

Due to the fact that they had made a mistake and used cleaned clover seed instead of grain screenings for baiting their pond, ducks will come high this year to W. H. Hornbrook, editor of the Albany Democrat; Walter M. Parker, an Albany grocer and Fred W. Schultz, proprietor of an Albany market.

The three men have a duck preserve one-half mile south of Fayetteville and had arranged with the owner of the farm on which their pond is situated to supply them with screenings with which to feed the ducks. When they went out the other day to bait the pond they went to the farmer's barn and seeing two sacks which had been placed near the door supposed it was their screenings. But when they dumped the contents of the sacks into the ponds they found they had picked up cleaned clover seed.

Just what it cost them to reimburse the farmer for the clover seed is a secret but it is estimated from \$25 to \$40. Incidentally they built and equipped a new hunting cabin on their preserve recently and now that they have been

using clover seed for feed the prices per duck this season will be large.

The incident has solved one problem, however. The owners were searching for an attractive name for their hunting place but after this episode their friends have named it for them. It will be known always as the "Clover Seed Duck Preserve."

On October 15 a meeting was held at Medford for the purpose of perfecting plans for the installation of an all-Oregon exhibit at Ashland for the entertainment, information and education of the host of tourists which will visit that section of the state during 1915. It is announced that in making up this exhibit every part of the state will be

given an equal chance. Eastern Oregon will have as good a show as western Oregon and the Deschutes valley will be as welcome to make a display as the Umpqua valley or the Willamette. The central idea is to secure settlers for Oregon lands.
