EAST MUST BE T TO ROUTE TICKE OREGON WAY

**TOM RICHARDSON STIR
BUSINESS MEN OF CT**

**Campaign Must Be Started
and Followed Up Consist-
ly and Persistently Unt
Date of Fair.**

Declaring that Oregon is the situated state in the west to accept of the tremendous travel that will to the San Francisco Exposition that it is absolutely necessary that individual begin at once and until the date of the big exposition, a campaign to get their friends to route their tickets via Oregon, Tom Richardson, promoter of the Portland Commercial Exposition, spoke to a representative number of business men of the city in the special club rooms yesterday afternoon.

Those leaving the east to the exposition, secure their ticket via Oregon when purchasing, will, in case they decide later to Oregon, be compelled to pay full fare from San Francisco to their points and full fare back to San Francisco again in order to use their trip tickets.

"Every commercial club, every church, every newspaper, business man and every individual must organize and carry on this or Oregon will lose a large amount of the benefits she should receive this great influx of people from the east," the speaker said. "A thousand dollars spent now in advertising more than \$10,000 afterwards. Letter that is sent from Oregon east must carry some message coming the Oregon way and indicating that it is necessary to have routed that way when purchasing. Every envelope should carry a note on the outside, and another on the inside. And it will not be sufficient to send that message a month or so before the fair. The movement must now and must be kept up every day until the great day is here. There must be continuous, persistent, everlastingly hammered into those who may come to the big fair. The message must be carried to hundreds of thousands who at the present time may have no idea of coming. It is sufficient to send it to those who already made up their minds to come. Those who make up their minds at the moment are most likely to be the ones who are coming merely to be a part of the fair. We want to reach those who at year or more over the trip, those who make the trip with the idea in their mind that they may find a country better than the one they are now in and want those people to make a trip in a way that will insure the Oregon. If their tickets are routed they will see our state. If they do not, San Francisco and surrounding country have the upper hand of us. It is up to us to get busy and stay. The campaign will get tiresome, monotonous, but it is the only way the results can be secured."

The speaker especially referred to personal letters as the most effective means of getting this result. Social letters from every person in the state to every friend in the east produce millions in ultimate results, the speaker said.

Mr. Richardson spoke of the many changes in Cottage Grove since he visited four years ago, the straggling village town now grown to a little city, with hard surfaced streets, modern store fronts, the best city in the world and had donated the poplars to the city.

He also spoke of a proposal on the part of Portland to loan money to farmers for purchase of live stock and dairy and urged its adoption here on a similar scale.

Mr. Richardson cited the fact every industry in the state with exception of the lumber business shown tremendous growth in the year, the fact that the banks have money than ever before and the crops are better than ever before entirely inconsistent with the depression that is shown throughout the state. "There is absolutely no slump in the price of real estate reality going to be a good thing. Put on your smile and get it's up to you."
