RULINGS OF INDUSTRIAL WELFARE COMMISSION GO INTO EFFECT

Minimum Wages, Employment of Minors and Surroundings of Employees Regulated.

The safeguarding of the lives, health and morals of the women and workers of the state was formally inaugurated Monday, Nov. 10, when the Industrial Welfare Commission went into effect. The commission is empowered by the act which created it to put into effect whatever regulations it deems necessary. The regulations which have been formulated make it unlawful to employ women or minors of either sex in surroundings which might tend to the morals of the employees, or to pay insufficient wages.

The commission has the power to set minimum rates of wages, the rates being sufficient to supply the necessary cost of living to women and maintain them in health. The rates are made out on the time, but there is provision made also for standard rates to be established in case of piece work as well. In any case where only a minimum rate has been established the commission may issue to a woman, physically defective or crippled by age or otherwise, a special license authorizing employment at such wage less than the minimum rate as shall be fixed by the commission.

Employers are required to keep a register of their women and minor employees and at any and all times for the commission with any data which they in any of their investigations.

In order that the rulings of the work no hardships, an amendment has been made providing that in establishments where minors are working together with adults, and the enforcement of an eight hour and twenty maximum day for female minors cause them to be dismissed, the commission may issue a permit allowing male minors to work the same hours as the adults in the establishment, if the hours are not excessive in view of the work required.

Fines ranging from \$25 to \$100 or imprisonment from 10 to 90 days, or both, are imposed for violation of the law.

The business office of the commission is at Portland.
