NEW LORANE ROAD IS IN PROSPECT

CONDEMNATION PROCEEDINGS
EXPECTED TO FOLLOW SUR-
VEY TO BE MADE.

Prospects are bright for the completion next year of the contemplated change in the north Lorane road, where by the big hill at the west end of the road will be circled and the distance shortened. The county surveyor has promised to survey the new road just as soon as he can get the time to do so. After that work is completed it is expected that the county court will start condemnation proceedings to secure the right of way, as the owner will not let the land go in any other way.

ANOTHER BUILDING IS TO START TODAY

Construction work will start today on a restaurant and office building on the Edd Jenks property at the corner of Main and Tenth streets. The building will be 30 x 30. Half will be occupied by Mr. Jenks for his personal use. It is understood that the other half has already been leased for restaurant purposes.

TWO LANE COUNTY CITIES DECLARED DRY

The Lane County Court Saturday declared that no liquor shall be sold in Springfield after January 1, 1914, upon canvassing the recent election and finding a majority of 58. The same order was made with regard to Florence, where the prohibition majority was 75. The order was made following the refusal of the circuit judge to grant the temporary injunction sought by those attempting to declare the recent election illegal.
