OREGON MILITIA READY FOR FIELD SERVICE

COTTAGE GROVE COMPANY HAS LONG THOUGHT CALL TO DUTY A POSSIBILITY.

Members of Sixth Co., C. A. R., located at Cottage Grove, have long thought it possible that they may be called to duty in Mexico. The following dispatch shows that complete preparations have been made for such an emergency:

Replying to a wire received from the New York Sun inquiring if he favored intervention on the part of the United States in Mexico and asking how many troops the state could furnish, Gov. Oswald West Wednesday night stated that in the event of war it could respond quickly. He wired:

"Replying to your telegram in reference to Mexican situation will say realizing the great responsibility resting upon President we uphold him in his efforts to bring about peaceful adjustment of the matter. However, we are all the time getting ready for business and are prepared to respond promptly to any call of the President with two regiments infantry, one battery field artillery and one ambulance company. Another regiment infantry

and several troops of cavalry would be available upon short notice.

H. S. POWELL Writes From California. Lakeport, Calif., Nov. 18.—Ed. Sentinel: I have promised to write to so many Cottage Grove people that I take the liberty of doing so through The Sentinel. We have a fine country here. It is up in the hills but all the hillsides are farmed. The soil is a sandy loam. The farmers are now putting in peas, lettuce, onions and other garden truck. We are having our first rains and the moisture makes things look fine.
