NEW FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Sixty-third Congress Convened in Regular Session Monday Noon.

Washington.—The first regular session of the Sixty-third congress convened in Washington at noon Monday, at which time the life of the special session, the longest continuous extraordinary session in the history of congress, expired by constitutional limitation. As the two houses already were organized and the legislative machinery in running order, the regular session will lose little time in getting down to business.

Two great projects have held the attention of congress and the country throughout the work of the year. One of these, tariff revision, crystallized into law in September.

Throughout the contests on tariff and currency the session has been marked by solidification of the democratic ranks. Demands of the democratic leaders that the currency bill be passed at once, bring the extra session to a stirring close, day and night sessions of the democratic currency conference having marked the last week, and day and night sessions of the senate are promised for the new session until currency legislation is concluded.

Commerce Court Abolished.

Although President Wilson urged congress to hold itself to the two chief projects, tariff and currency, several matters of general importance were considered. One important legislative act was the so-called Newlands law for mediation and conciliation in labor disputes.

The abolishment of the United States commerce court also was accomplished, through an amendment to the deficiency appropriation bill. Another appropriation bill "rider" took out of the classified civil service most of the deputy United States marshals and deputy collectors of internal revenue. Exemption of labor unions from prosecution under the anti-trust laws so far as certain funds were concerned also was accomplished.

Trusts Next Big Question.

Naturally the trust question looms up as the thing in the program to enlist special attention following the tariff and currency. The administration trust program in its entirety, however, is not likely to be presented to congress at the beginning of the regular session. One reason is that President Wilson seems to believe that the way to make progress is to do one big thing at a time. Another is that the president himself has not fully worked out his trust legislation policy.

At the outset he will ask for an appropriation to enable the bureau of corporations to make the exhaustive investigation of facts bearing on economy of production and with respect to the question of competition versus monopoly, which has been outlined heretofore. The ultimate program with respect to the trusts cannot be prosecuted until the investigation is completed. In the meantime, however, the house will give attention to some phases of the problem on which investigations already held have thrown sufficient light.

Storage To Be Regulated.

An elaborate anti-high cost of living bill, not only to resist cold storage of food, but to penalize agreements for storage, pooling, division of territory, interference with competition or other restraint of trade in foodstuffs, was introduced by Representative McKellar, of Tennessee.

The new bill, which will be urged immediately before the house committee on commerce, would make the maximum period of storage on beef or its products seven months, veal two months, pork four months, sheep or goats four months, lamb or kids three months.

Free Bullets Provided.

War department officials who have been preparing, with Representative Kahn, a bill to distribute 800,000 Krag-Jorgensen rifles now stored in government arsenals to civilian rifle clubs in order to promote marksmanship throughout the country, have decided to include free ammunition with the rifles. It has been decided that school cadet organizations also will be supplied with free rifles and ammunition.

Representative Kahn, as chairman of the National Defense League, which suggested the distributing of the rifles, will introduce the bill in the house.

Prohibits Watering of R. R. Stocks.

Indicating the probable angle of interstate commerce legislation during the coming session, Representative Sims of Tennessee introduced a bill to prohibit the watering of railroad stocks.

The measure would make it unlawful for any common carrier to issue any stocks, bonds or other evidence of indebtedness except for some necessary purpose such as extension and improvement, unless approved by the interstate commerce commission.

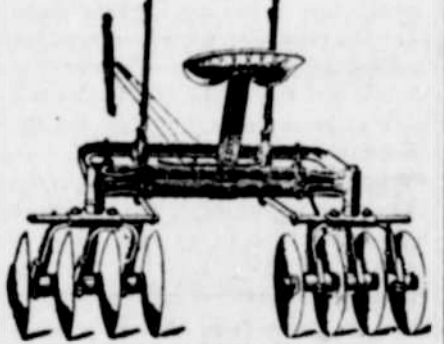

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Elections Held Invalid.

Salem.—Every local option election held in the state November 4 except in towns in which that date was the day of a regular city election, is void, according to a decision rendered Judge William Galloway of the Marion county circuit court in the suit brought by John Stillman, representing the saloon interests of Salem, to restrain the county court from issuing an order declaring Salem to be dry territory as a result of the election held here on that date.

Russians May Locate in Oregon.

Albany.—That 25 or 30 Russian families from Northern Mexico and Lower California may establish a colony in the Willamette valley, became known here through two representatives of the colony, who said they were emissaries sent out to look for a suitable location. After looking over this section they went north. They said that the Willamette valley impressed them.

Strawberries Flourish in Winter.

Newport.—Strawberry shortcake made with berries grown and ripened in November by Peter Shermer, who has a farm seven miles up the bay from Newport, was served in Newport Thanksgiving. There will be fresh strawberries, too, for Christmas and New Years. They can be bought in the local stores at two boxes for 25 cents.

First Dirt Turned.

Ashland.—The first spadeful of dirt on Jackson county's new highway over the Siskiyou was turned by Sam Hill. The scene was near the Barron ranch, seven miles south of Ashland, where the Pacific Highway intersects the Klamath Falls road. Brief speeches were made by Governor West, Sam Hill, W. M. Colvig, of Medford, and B. R. Greer, of Ashland.

Hop Men Plan League.

Rickreall.—Polk County hopmen have planned to form an organization to eliminate all middleman's profit and to prevent short selling. After the meeting of hopgrowers in Salem a number of growers in Polk county districts started a movement for the independent growers' league.

FRUITS OF TOIL MAY BE LOST

Old Mining Location Likely to Oust Homesteaders.

Baker.—Two farms in the Lost Basin country, seven miles north of Durkee, brought from a wilderness by the energy of a young man and a young woman who came from Ohio to seek a living in Oregon, are about to be lost to their owners if an appeal they have taken on a finding of the land office at Vale is decided against them. The young man is Charles Chamberlain, and the young woman, Miss Rose Chamberlain, his sister.

When the places had been developed and were just beginning to pay, a contest, brought by W. J. Hughes, a retired minister of Prairie City, was made on the ground that he had a prior right to the land by virtue of a mining claim there which he had taken 20 years ago and later abandoned.

The two homesteads have been fenced and each has a house on it. The young man also built a barn on his tract of 160 acres as well as a granary. Fifty acres of the tract has been put under cultivation, while the young woman has 18 acres of her 135-acre tract plowed.

Rogue River Run Small.

Wedderburn.—The fishing season on Rogue river closed by law on November 20, but few fish have been caught this month. The fall run of fish did not come up to expectations nor to that of former years when the late R. D. Hume operated the cannery here.

Brookings is Building Up.

Gold Beach.—The new town of Brookings, in southern Curry County, is building up rapidly. A recent census showed more than 300 persons living within the town limits, which makes it now the largest town in Curry county.

Oakland Skunks Proliferous.

Oakland.—Skunks are so plentiful in this vicinity that catching them has become a lucrative occupation. A local barber has \$135 worth of skins of animals caught during recesses from tonsorial duties.

Iowa Fugitive Caught.

The Dallas.—Sheriff Chrisman arrested C. E. Harvey at Big Eddy. The prisoner is wanted at Council Bluffs, Iowa, for absconding with \$800 belonging to a railroad company.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The fifth annual exhibition of the Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock association is in session at Portland.

The annual meeting of the Oregon Woolgrowers association will be held in Portland, December 10.

District No. 42, Tillamook, now has a new schoolhouse, built from money raised by a special bonding election.

The Polk County School Officers' association has been formed and the first meeting is to be held Saturday, December 20.

Miss E. M. Thompson, an exhibitor at the chrysanthemum show at Creswell, named a pale pink "mum" the "Miss Jessie Wilson" flower.

At the city election, December 16, Ashland will vote on the wet and dry proposition, as an annual custom. It is now dry.

By a vote of 240 to 69, Klamath Falls has voted to bond the city for the purpose of raising money for building a new city hall.

The Oregon Agricultural cadet band has made plans for a tour of Willamette valley and eastern Oregon during the holiday season.

The twenty-eighth annual meeting of the Oregon Horticultural society will be held in the Portland public library December 10-12.

B. F. Nichols of Laidlaw boasts of having been sheriff in Oregon 67 years ago. He first served when Oregon was a provisional government, and was first elected in June, 1846.

Senator Lane has introduced a joint resolution for the preliminary examination and survey of the Willamette and Columbia rivers from Portland to the sea.

Following a week's search in the snows of the Blue mountains Sheriff Kelsey of Wheeler county, has captured Mack Vaughn, and returned him to Fossil on a charge of bootlegging.

Albert H. Stone was drowned when the speed power boat Oregon Wolf IV turned turtle in the Willamette river near Portland, while going at a rate of more than 40 miles an hour. John E. Wolf and Orth Mathiot escaped.

With the assurance that not less than 500 delegates from all sections of the state would be in attendance, elaborate preparations were made for the commercial meeting held in Roseburg Thursday.

A year's incarceration in the jail at Albany is the record of Albert Peacock, convicted of violating local option laws. Unless he gets released as result of an appeal, he will have to remain in jail a considerable time longer.

Twenty-five farmers of Central Oregon have been given packets of dry land alfalfa seed sufficient to plant one acre, the officials of the Oregon Trunk railway seeking to demonstrate the possibilities of this particular kind of seed.

A new monolithic silo has just been completed at the Salem Indian school. This is one of the very few monolithic structures of this class in the Pacific northwest, and is said to be one of the finest in the United States. The structure is about 40 feet high and has a capacity of nearly 150 tons of silage.

Judgment for \$950 and costs was rendered in favor of Milton Garnett of Benton county, against Frank Edwards, a Portland broker on a deal for the sale of a team of horses made 20 years ago. Service was had when the defendant returned to the state after the long absence.

M. V. O'Shea, professor of science and the art of education at the University of Wisconsin, has been secured as the principal spaker for the meeting of the western division of the State Teachers' association, which will be held in Salem December 22 to 24, inclusive.

In pursuance of the terms of a contract entered into between the government and the Maxwell Land company, of Hermiston, Secretary Lane has ordered a public sale of several hundred acres of land embraced within the Umatilla irrigation project. The sale will be held at Hermiston, on December 27.

Not until 95 per cent of the area of land held by the settlers in the first unit of the Tumalo irrigation project, Crook county, is signed up under contracts with the state for water, will the work be commenced on the distribution system for the unit, according to an order of the Desert Land Board.

Senator Chamberlain speaking at a luncheon to Latin-American diplomats said he believed the United States should make some adequate reparation to Colombia for its loss of territory when ex-President Roosevelt took the Panama canal zone away from it. Senator Chamberlain also spoke in favor of barring Orientals from the United States.

A movement is on foot led by the Multnomah Anglers' club of Portland to perfect an association, that will embrace all the rod and gun clubs of the state. The expressed object of the organization is to unite the sporting interests of Oregon in one central body to effectively secure needed legislation, to offset the cannery interests and to secure equal distribution of eggs.
