MAKES PLEA FOR IMMEDIATE ATTENTION TO PURCHASES FROM HUMANITARIAN STANDPOINT.

State Labor Commissioner, O. P. Hoff adds his voice to that of the busy merchant and the tired shop girl in a plea to the public to shop early. His instructions are to do your shopping early in the month, early in the week, early in the day. He makes the plea from the humanitarian viewpoint that considers the overworked salesmen and saleswomen, from the business viewpoint that looks to the shopper's own best interests in the matter of securing attention and choice goods, and from the viewpoint of the employer who will find pressure brought to bear upon him in the last few days before the holidays to break the law in regard to the hours of employment.

"So, no matter where you shop, shop early—early in the month, early in the week, early in the day," says Mr. Hoff.

## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(Official Publication)

Dec. 1, 1913. Council met in regular session, roll was called and minutes read and approved.

Ordinance No. 395, being an ordinance regulating the construction and management of livery stables was read first time and laid over to an adjourned meeting.

The Council proceeded to canvass the vote of December 1 with the following results: For Mayor, J. H. Chambers—first ward, 143, second ward, 234, third ward, 72, total, 449; scattering, 4; total, 454.

For Recorder, J. E. Young—first ward, 137, second ward, 226, third ward,

71, total, 434; scattering 3; total, 437.

For Treasurer, Herbert Eakin—first ward, 97, second ward, 147, third ward, 39, total 283; Harry Short—first ward, 57, second ward, 101, third ward, 44, total, 192.

For Councilman for first ward, Geo. Knowles, 127; for Councilman second ward, J. S. Silsby, 124; D. Sterling, 110; for Councilman for third ward, A. W. Kime, 73. The officers receiving the highest number of votes were declared duly elected.

On motion the bill of Hubbell and Damewood for the balance of the contract price on the Layng Creek dam was laid on the table indefinitely.

On motion a warrant was ordered drawn in favor of the Mayor and each

Councilman for the sum of \$12.00 for services during the year.

On motion warrants were ordered drawn in favor of each of the judges and clerks of election for the sum of \$1.50 and in favor of Sam Newcomb for the use of voting places.

A petition for a light on the corner of West Main and I Streets was read and referred to the Light Committee.

On motion the portion of sidewalk on the north side of Adams Avenue east of the railroad was condemned and the Marshal instructed to order a new one built.
