Preparing for Immigration

That the Pacific Coast has ample time to prepare for an ultimate influx of European immigrants, is apparent from reports received by the Oregon State Immigration Commission. This conclusion has been reached by that office after making an extensive investigation in cooperation with the Oregon Development League, of reported sales of thousands of steamship tickets on the installment plan to prospective immigrants via the Panama Canal is without foundation.
Rumors of a great flood of European immigrants was to pour upon the Pacific Coast as soon as the Panama Canal was open, has created great anxiety amongst civic organizations. The Oregon State Immigration Commission felt that if such a throng was actually in prospect, it was incumbent upon the Commission to ascertain what provisions could be made for the distribution of arriving aliens away from the congested centers.
So far as a thorough investigation could disclose, no steamship company has yet quoted passenger rates for immigrants via the canal, and no such tickets are being sold either for cash or on the installment plan. Persistence of the old rumors caused this office to make such investigations and the reports now in hand from the American consuls stationed at the important ports of Europe, utterly discredit the rumors of a direct Pacific Coast immigration.
The state of Oregon is especially well equipped through its commercial organizations banded together to handle any possible inflow of agricultural immigration. The Atlantic coast states have not and never had such an organization as exists in this state for the distribution of agriculturists upon the soils of Oregon.
Ultimately positive that the favorable climate and inviting opportunities of the Pacific Coast will attract a large immigration from Europe through the canal, still the immigration commission feels no alarm over any immediate overwhelming influx.

CUT DOWN MILES OF ROAD IF NECESSARY, BUT USE ROCK

"The county court is on the right road when it begins to tax narrow tires," is the pun perpetrated by Mr. Veatch. "Narrow tires are a curse to any road in the valley," he says, and he should know, for the beautiful gravel road built by him last year was nearly ruined by hauling over it heavy loads on narrow tired wagons by people who lived outside of the district.
"The legislature should pass a law prohibiting the shipping of 'narrow tires' into the state," is Mr. Veatch's emphatic statement. "The county court could well afford to give a bonus of \$5.00 on every wide tired wagon brought into the county. It could be paid out of the road fund, and the treasury would ultimately be money ahead by the procedure."
During his two years' service as supervisor, Mr. Veatch has built ten miles or more of road besides keeping up extensive repair work. Over ten thousand yards of gravel have been hauled an average of one mile, but he believes a large part of the money he has spent has been wasted because the gravel will not stand up under the test to which the roads of his district are put. The Row River road, without question, carries the heaviest traffic that comes into this city. The taxpayers, he believes, would have been ahead by having insisted upon rock roads, cutting down the number of miles built each year if necessary.

SHOULD BE GREATEST DAIRY REGION OF WORLD

Eugene Commercial Club Man Is Emphatic

MANAGER DURYEA HEARTILY COMMENDS IDEA OF COOPERATIVE FINANCING OF BUSINESS.

The statement that money cannot be made in Lane County with cows is branded as "a fallacy born of laziness and unprogressive ideas" by M. J. Duryea, manager of the Eugene Commercial Club, appropriating the words of "Farmer Smith" of the O. W. B. and N. R. B. In a recent letter to the Eugene Register he commends the stories of "Rambling Register Man" Pixley and especially his idea of forming a cooperative organization along the line of a building and loan association for the purpose of stimulating and financing the dairy business.

Speaking of the possibilities of a dairying future for Oregon Mr. Duryea says: "I believe the dairy business is one of the most profitable of our agricultural industries, in spite of the assertions to the contrary made by one of your correspondents a short time ago. I have consulted men like Prof. Thomas Shaw, the noted agriculturist for the Northern Pacific, Dr. Wythecombe, of our own agricultural college, and others, and they all say Western Oregon ought to be one of the greatest dairy sections of the United States and that it is admirably adapted to this important industry. The mildness of our climate, the excellence of our forage crops, the ability to grow green and succulent foods all during the winter season, and the demand for dairy products make this a splendid field for the activities of the intelligent and energetic dairy man."

He goes on to attribute the real source of all wealth to the farmer but also points out that the farmer is handicapped in getting money to finance his undertakings in the way that other businesses are accustomed to do. Mr. Pixley suggests that through a carefully worked out scheme something could be done to devise a system whereby cows might become collateral which the banks making loans to farmers might hold if they were protected in some way as to their care and keep. "Worked out carefully in detail, if at all feasible," says Mr. Duryea, "it would protect the investor and the borrower and at the same time give stability to a most important industry."

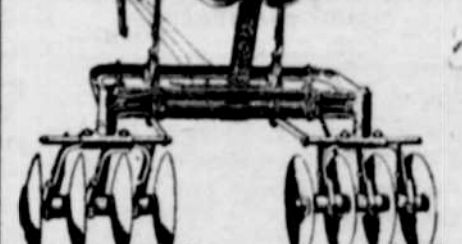
