MARRIAGES FALL BEHIND IN NON-LEAP YEAR

The increase in the number of marriages in the county during the year just past falls far short of keeping up with the increase in population. The cause for the shrinkage in the proportion of 'Cupid business' done is variously attributed to hard times, the new law requiring prospective husbands to pass a medical examination and to the fact that it was not leap year, while the year before was.

During the year 1913, 411 tickets to wedded bliss were issued by the county clerk, while in 1912, 403 were issued, being eight less than for licenses, with 47, while September was a close second, with 44. The number issued each month was as follows: January 27; February 22; March 24; April 32; May 40; June 47; July 31; August 41; September 44; October 37; November 26 and December 40.
