The city did not feed the men, however, until this morning, when the city marshal provided sandwiches and coffee and started them on their way again. There were 21 in the advance party. They caused no disturbance. Twenty more are expected to arrive today from Creswell, where they spent last night.

ROSEBURG CHILDREN LOST IN WOODS TWO DAYS

After wandering around in the woods for two days completely exhausted from fright and exposure, the four children of Mr. and Mrs. Mathews Adams, living near Roseburg, arrived late Monday night at the home of Mr. Baldwin, a homesteader living near the head of Myrtle Creek. According to the story told by Fay Adams, eighteen years of age, the oldest of the four, they became lost soon after leaving their home, 11 miles east of Roseburg Sunday morning. They had intended to visit Pine Ridge, where they had frequently gone before, in search of pitch, but became confused and wandered from the trail. During most of the time they were out rain fell and snow was encountered in places. The parents had almost given up hope of finding their children alive. It is almost a miracle that they did not die of exposure.

Calls Come Exactly Ten Years Apart.
