WORK OF INSPECTOR STEWART HIGHLY ENDORSED

Severity Necessary to Keep Up Orchards

COMMENDATION COMES FROM COMMUNITY WHERE MANY HAVE SUFFERED IN ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.

In rigidly enforcing the laws of the state against fruit disease, Inspector Stewart of this city has found it necessary to confiscate and destroy much fruit offered for sale. A number of Eugene fruit sellers have suffered as a result of this activity and Mr. Stewart has at times been severely criticized by those who aired their troubles in the newspapers of that city. He cares not for the criticism, but the following editorial in a recent issue of The Guard is significant that his work is being upheld by those who have the future success of the fruit industry at heart:

"If Lane County is going to realize the most possible from its orchard tracts it is necessary for the fruit men of the county to cooperate universally with Fruit Inspector Stewart and his deputies. Inspector Stewart, with the systematic program he has outlined for fighting fruit diseases, is worthy of the commendation of every orchardist and every commercial or promotion body in the county.

"As Mr. Stewart said yesterday, 'It is up to the fruitmen to clean up their orchards or quit.' No fruit at all is a better advertisement for the county than unhealthful, diseased fruit. Not that the fruit of Lane County is in poor condition. It is not from a comparative point of view. It has improved greatly in recent years. But in any fruit growing locality in the United States disease stands ready to attack the trees whenever the fruit men become lax in their care.

"The taking of the responsibility for the care of Lane County fruit out of the hands of the state horticultural organization and placing it entirely into the hands of local men who are thoroughly acquainted with the fruit tracts of this part of the valley is a progressive step in the horticultural improvement of Lane County. The combining of the efforts of the county court and the inspecting officials by the appointment of the fruit inspector as a deputy county commissioner clothes the inspector with the authority that the orchardists are duty bound to respect. "Inspector Stewart and his deputies, J. J. Baker and George W. Taylor, are all fruit men of experience and are thoroughly equipped for their work. It is necessary that requests coming from them for the spraying or other care of fruit trees be complied with without question."
