Turtle Found After 30 Years.

James T. Clow, a veteran conductor of the S. P., now holding a run on one of the new electric trains in the lower valley, bids fair to meet an old boyhood friend of the early '80s. Thirty years or more ago Clow, when a boy, captured a mud turtle in a slough down near Junction City and carved his name and the date upon the creature's shell. He turned the turtle loose and perhaps soon forgot it.

A few days ago a farmer living near Porter Station, on the new line of the P. E. & E., picked up a turtle and was surprised to find some lettering on its back. Brushing away the dirt, the former found Clow's name and the date just as he wrote it years ago. Ed Frank, who is now conductor on the passenger train between Eugene and Whiteoak, on the P. E. & E., was told by this farmer a few days ago of his find and the farmer inquired of the conductor if he had ever known of anybody by the name of Clow. Frank knew that Clow had lived in that part of the county when a boy and replied that his old friend, the conductor on the electric train, must be the man. As soon as he is able to see him, Conductor Frank will inform Clow that his old friend, the turtle, has been found and that he appears anxious to see him. The turtle possibly learned that Clow was a railroad conductor and wandered over toward the newly built line in hopes of once more meeting the person who left his card on him so many years ago.—Eugene Guard.

Colonist Rates On Soon.

Railroads in the Northwest are beginning to advertise the spring colonist rates which become effective March 15. The rates this year will be the same as formerly, being \$33 from Chicago, \$30 from Missouri River points and \$25 from the Colorado territory. The low-rate period will continue 32 days. Although the reduced fares will be extensively advertised, the railroads will make no active effort this year to procure organized parties of settlers for the Northwest.

MINIMUM WAGE FOR WOMEN GOES INTO EFFECT

FIFTY-FOUR HOURS FIXED AS MAXIMUM IN COMPUTING A WEEK.

Beginning February 7 the minimum wage for women in the industries of the state doing work by the time rate will be \$8.25, in accordance with the provisions of the order of the Industrial Welfare Commission which becomes effective on that date. By the same ruling 54 hours is fixed as the maximum for a week's work, and 10 hours the maximum for any day. Inexperienced workers shall receive no less than \$6.00 and that sum for no longer than a year. The provision which makes it unlawful to keep a woman at work after 8:30 p. m. applies to such establishments as mercantile houses, manufacturing or laundry establishments, and not to such work as by its very nature requires night work. Telephone and telegraph operators, confectionery shop, restaurant and hotel employees and women on the staffs of morning papers are not affected. Fines of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 and imprisonment not to exceed three months are the penalties for infringement of this law. All employers affected by this new law are required to keep a copy of it posted in a conspicuous place in each room of their establishments in which women workers are employed.

Many Cases Settled.

Attorney J. S. Medley was in Eugene Monday looking after the interests of a number of his clients, who had cases coming up before the circuit court. A final decree was granted in the case of Percival I. Rust against the Oregon Pacific & Eastern Railway, in which the jury assessed the railway company \$400 damages for the piece of land desired by the road. Other cases of the railway against Rust and Rust against the railway were dismissed. The case of A. M. and C. M. Johnson against G. B. Pritchard, et al, also was dismissed. Mr. Medley received a confirmation on foreclosure in the cases of J. D. Matlock against J. B. Rouse and of Lurch against Rouse.
