VICTIMS OF MEXICAN BANDIT ARE BURNED

**Fifty or More Passengers and
Crew Believed to Have
Perished in Tunnel.**

Cumbre, Mexico.—Nothing but char-
red bones and buttons were found by
the rescuing party which, by the aid
of oxygen helmets and pulmotors, suc-
ceeded in penetrating the Cumbre tun-
nel from the south portal as far as the
locomotive and first two cars of the
passenger train. They were probably
killed when the engine of the passen-
ger train crashed into the burning
freight train, which had been pushed
into the tunnel by Castillo's bandits
several hours before.

It is now believed that every one of
the 50 or more passengers and the
crew aboard the train when it dashed
into the tunnel are dead.

Railroad men are furious at Castil-
lo's act. Last week 22 of his men were
captured and executed by the rebels
and the next day, apparently in re-
venge, he captured the freight train,
ran it into the south end of the tunnel
about 200 feet and there set fire to it.
Castillo's failure to send back warn-
ing of his act is regarded as the most
cruel and murderous act of his career
of outlawry and there is a disposition
here to criticize General Francisco
Villa for not having crushed him long
ago.

CELILO CANAL NEARS FINISH

**Big Blast Removes Last Obstruction
to Flow of Water.**

The Dalles, Or.—About 80 per cent
of the work on The Dalles-Cello canal
was completed when 10,500 pounds of
powder were exploded by the pressing
of an electric button. The last ob-
struction to water flowing from end
to end was blown out.

The completion of this important
improvement will give a large portion
of the inland Empire the benefit of
water transportation. It will open to
steamboat navigation the Columbia
river from Priest Rapids to the sea, a
distance of about 400 miles, and dur-
ing the greater portion of the year the
Snake river from Lewiston to the sea,
a distance of about 465 miles.

May Sue Rockefeller for Taxes.
Cleveland, Ohio.—County Attorney
Locher received instructions from At-
torney General Hogan to sue John D.
Rockefeller for his personal taxes.
The Cuyahoga county authorities had
estimated approximately \$12,000,000
was due them.

AMERICAN-JAPANESE RELATIONS IMPROVED

Washington.—Notable improvement
in the relations between the United
States and Japan is believed to have
resulted from the events in the house
of representatives last week connect-
ed with the passage of the Burnett im-
migration bill. Reports from Tokio
are to the effect that a profound im-
pression was caused in the Japanese
capital, not only by the refusal of the
house to include in the bill the pro-
posed prohibition against the entry of
Japanese into the United States, but
even more by the non-partisan appeal
of Representative Mann.

The Japanese statesmen are declar-
ed to have been much pleased; by the
house's reception of the appeal for fair
treatment of aliens and for abstention
from legislative interference with the
executive department in its efforts to
arrive at a settlement of the open is-
sue between the two countries.

Admiration of Bryan By Wilson.
Baltimore.—In a letter to William
L. Marbury, published in a Baltimore
paper, President Wilson condemns
free tolls through the Panama canal
as clear violation of the Hay-Pauncef-
ote treaty and incidentally takes oc-
casion to pay a tribute to Secretary of
State William Jennings Bryan that
shows the terms of intimate friendli-
ness and co-operation existing between
them.

Radium Quacks Feared.
New York.—The New York city de-
partment of health has issued a warn-
ing against "quacks" who might seek
to take advantage of the popular in-
terest aroused by recent experiments
with radium in the treatment of can-
cer.

Trial Cost Is \$250,000.
San Francisco.—The cost of the
Western Fuel Company conspiracy
trial in the United States District
Court here was estimated to have
reached a total of \$250,000.

Football Coaches Barred From Lines.
New York.—The Intercollegiate foot-
ball rules committee decided that here-
after coaches should be barred from
the side lines. This was the most rad-
ical change in the rules adopted at
the meeting.

Value and Preservation of Hen Manure.

A recent bulletin of the Maine Agri-
cultural Experiment Station shows
that the poultryman or farmer can ma-
terially add to the profits of his busi-
ness by properly caring for the dropp-
ings of his fowls. For example, it is
shown that the droppings from 1000
fowls if preserved without needless loss
are worth at least \$300 per annum, and
this estimate is based on the assump-
tion that less than half of the dropp-
ings, or only 30 pounds per hen per
year, can be collected.

According to the Maine station, the
droppings should be collected daily and
mixed with substances which will (1)
prevent loss of nitrogen, (2) add suf-
ficient potash and phosphoric acid to
make a better balanced fertilizer, and
(3) improve the mechanical condition
of the manure so that it can be applied
to the land with a manure spreader.

This can be done as follows: To
each 30 pounds of the manure add 10
pounds of sawdust, good dried loam, or
peat, 16 pounds of acid phosphate, and
8 pounds of kainit. Such a mixture
will contain about 1.25 per cent of
nitrogen, 4.5 per cent of phosphoric acid,
and 2 per cent of potash, which, used at
the rate of 2 tons to the acre would fur-
nish 50 pounds of nitrogen, 185 pounds
of phosphoric acid, and 80 pounds of
potash, and at the present price of fer-
tilizer, which, although not fine enough
to work well in drills, can be success-
fully applied with a manure spreader.
The treated manure should be well
sheltered until time to apply to the
land—that is, shortly before plowing.
