When Buttons Were Big.

"As it was still the fashion," he said, "to wear buttons as big as a five franc piece upon which cupids, flowers and landscapes were cut in cameo, I went into that business. I got 12 sous for each."—Philadelphia Ledger.

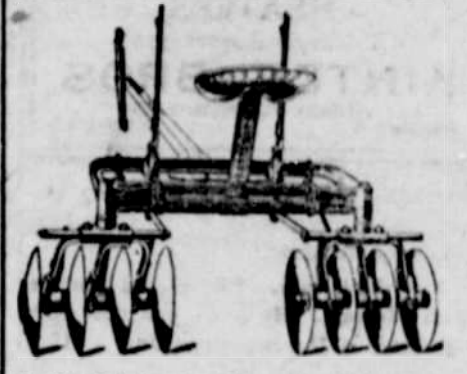
