BOYS SOLVE OWN PROBLEM.

Nothing that has recently happened in school affairs of the city has so pleased The Sentinel as the organization of high school students into an "army" to protect the new building from vandalism. Not only is it thus proven that the students appreciate what the taxpayers have given them, not only is their beautiful new home thus guaranteed against injury, but a movement has been started that will do much other good.

Two years ago several beautiful trees were destroyed and other unruly things were done. The organization of this "army" means that these things will not be repeated. This movement if properly nurtured by instructors will instill into the youthful breasts a conception of law and order that means much in their preparation for useful citizens.

It is also certain that young men organized to protect school property are not likely to countenance the defacing of other property—certainly will have no part in such proceedings themselves. This is certainly highly desirable, for one of the hardest problems to solve is that of teaching young folks (and a great many older ones) the rights of property.

Defacing woodwork, robbing flower gardens, breaking windows of empty houses, carrying away property found unguarded, all of these are crimes against the rights of property owners that may be stopped through enlarging the influence and usefulness of this volunteer "army."

Possibly the boys themselves have shown a way to solve a problem with which their elders have been unsuccessful.

By a margin of 175 votes Eugene has voted a \$110,000 high school building. In a city having the most important state-supported educational institution, a better showing was expected, but as far as results are concerned the size of the majority will make no difference.

As far as actual results are concerned Oregon might better be without an exhibition at the fair itself than fail to have the proposed exhibit at Ashland.

At the fair itself our magnificent exhibit will be so little better than many others—of course it will be some better—but it will be so little better, that as the vast throngs, already surfeited with the best that others have produced, hurry by in an attempt to see a little bit of everything, the cursory examination our exhibit will receive will make but a faint impression.

But at Ashland an exhibit will have no competition and passengers fagged out with the long ride either going or coming, will welcome the opportunity to refresh themselves for a half hour or forty-five minutes examining the wonderful products of the greatest outdoor garden in the world. After coming from San Francisco, where the hawkers and the hotel keepers and the concessions people have shown their extreme parsimony, the unusual generosity of the Oregon soil will make a pleasing and refreshing contrast.

Instead of admiring the magnificent proportions of the fair buildings and the magnitude of the great exhibition itself, they will wonder at the magnificent proportions of Oregon vegetables, instead of straining their necks at tall buildings, they will crane them a little further and get a view of Oregon grains and grasses; instead of admiring the beauty of the electrical display and the paintings they will wonder at the beauty of the Oregon fruit, tinted and crimsoned in the salubrious Oregon ozone. They will say "Why, everything we saw at the fair must grow right here, and they kept their best for the Ashland exhibit."

Because of the necessity of all trains being given a thorough examination either before or after crossing the Siskiyou Mountains, trains make a longer stop at Ashland than at any other point between the Missouri River and the Pacific Ocean. In addition it is the last stop in the state on the way to California and the first stop coming from California. Ashland is, therefore, the psychological point for such an exhibition of products of this great state.
