OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Lived Six Months With Broken Neck.

Pendleton.—After living for more than six months with a broken neck, Frank Dunton, Canyon City stockman, died in this city. Dunton, while watching some children playing in his barn, endeavored to show them some tricks on a trapeze. He fell to the floor, striking on his head, and fracturing the sixth and seventh vertebrae. Since then he has been entirely paralyzed.

Sunday Closing is Intent.

Salem.—To prohibit the conduct of business and gainful amusements on Sunday is the object of a measure to be initiated at the next election by the Washington County Christian Endeavor Union. The bill was approved as to form by Secretary of State Olcott.

The measure exempts drug stores, physicians' shops, undertakers, livery stables, butchers and bakers.

Long Lost Diamond in Chicken's Crop.

Clatskanie.—About eight months ago Mrs. Robert Bryant lost a diamond setting out of a ring. Long search for the missing gem proved unavailing. A few days ago, on the occasion of her husband's birthday, as she was preparing a fowl for dinner, she found the lost stone in the crop of the fowl.

Regatta Plans Started.

Astoria.—A mass meeting of business men and citizens generally is to be held on the evening of March 3, when a committee will be selected to take charge of the 19th annual regatta. This meeting will also fix the date for the water carnival, but it is generally understood that July 2, 3, and 4 will be selected.

Party Lines Only Test.

Salem.—Attorney General Crawford, in an opinion, holds that a qualified elector was not limited in signing the petition of one candidate for an office, but may sign petitions of all candidates if they are members of the party with which he affiliates.

WOULD CONSOLIDATE BOARDS

Desert Land Board, State Engineer and Water Board May Go.

Salem.—A movement has been started to initiate a measure at the next election to abolish the state desert land board, the state water board and the state engineer's office, and put the business handled by these three departments in charge of one board, thus effecting a considerable saving to the taxpayers.

Governor West states that at the recent meeting of the Oregon Irrigation congress in Portland, delegates from Central Oregon put the proposition up to him and asked for his approval. He said he favored the movement and would give his support to the proposed measure. He said a large saving would be made by such a change.

He declared that the desert land board, as now constituted, is a useless affair, and the state engineer's office is an expensive luxury. The plan is to give the one board to be created in place of the three departments authority to appoint an engineer.

Fishing Rules Protested.

Astoria.—During the past few days quite a number of letters have been sent by packers and fishermen to Colonel McKinstry, of the United States Engineers, protesting against the proposal of the department to prohibit fishing within a prescribed district at the mouth of the river.

Goat Industry Started.

The Dalles.—W. F. Ripley has started a new industry in this vicinity, that of goat-raising. He raises the Toggenberg goat, which is the mainstay of the cheese industry of Switzerland. This goat is of the blue-blooded variety, and with a pedigree, it is more valuable than the thoroughbred cow.

Few Dogs Show Symptoms.

Baker.—Forty-two dogs have been killed in Baker as the result of violation of the muzzling ordinance passed by the city commissioner as a preventive measure against spread of rabies. Only six of these have shown symptoms of the disease.

Diphtheria Rages at Brooks.

Brooks.—With an epidemic of diphtheria prevailing, many children are being withdrawn from the schools, although the disease appears in a mild form. One death is reported.

W. H. Meredith Out For Congress.

Bandon.—W. H. Meredith, county attorney of Curry, stated here that he would be a candidate for the democratic nomination for representative from this district.

National Salmon Day.

On the Pacific Coast the celebration of National Salmon Day, March 13, will take the form of public gatherings and banquets at Portland, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles and other coast centers. Fishers, operators, scientists and public officials will be in attendance and programs of an extremely interesting nature will be furnished.

Minerals in Oregon.

What's the matter with the mining industry, is answered by A. M. Swartley, mining engineer of the Oregon Bureau of Mines, in the first volume of "The Mineral Resources of Oregon." Prof. Swartley attributes the present stagnation to the absence of promoters and speculators, who have been very justly driven from the field by publicity and postal supervision. "They lost most of the money that they

invested to develop prospects," he concedes, "but now that they have been driven to cover and there are few to take their place, the prospector and the investor are not brought together." Prospectors will not locate claims unless there are some sales, and investors who buy nothing but mines complain of a scarcity. Several other things are said to be the matter with the mining industry by Professor Swartley, who offers remedies. Every miner, operator and owner should read this volume, which may be had by addressing Dean H. M. Parks, Director, O. A. C., Corvallis, Oregon.
