CANDIDATES FOR COUNTY JUDGE.

One of the most important positions to be filled at the forthcoming election is that of County Judge and an unusually peculiar condition exists as to candidates for that office.

It is presumed that the candidate successful at the Republican primaries will be elected in November. The candidates on the Republican ticket are Senator Calkins and Col. W. G. D. Mercer. Those fond of puzzles might try to reason how and why either of these men became candidates. While both have been active in public affairs, and while either might make a competent County Judge, neither has directed his energies in a way to show what qualifications he may have for the position nor to logically lead up to his becoming a candidate for the office.

Senator Calkins is a lawyer and generally reputed to have been an able and aggressive legislator. He has been a successful business man and has accumulated sufficient of this world's goods to make him independent of public office. His decision to become a candidate for the County Judgeship, instead of returning to the Senate, came as a total surprise to his friends.

Col. Mercer is a veteran of the Civil War, is rather young for his 62 years of age, is a man of scholarly attainments, is a prolific essayist and an orator of no mean ability. He is a stranger and owns a place in the suburbs of Eugene. During his service with the United States secret service he became familiar with national and international affairs, and saved a competence, most of which was frittered away in doctoring for a disease of the throat which the mild Oregon climate relieved without fee.

The qualifications of these gentlemen might fit them for other and higher offices but they seem somewhat incongruous in a contest for the office they seek. But both are aggressive and earnest men and The Sentinel does not draw the conclusion that qualifications for higher and possibly better things unfits either for the office which one or the other seems certain to fill. The Sentinel is merely struck by the peculiarity of the situation.

opinion in a news story. This is an inexorable rule upon all newspapers making any pretense whatever to perfection in their field. Possibly some contributors do not understand what is meant by editorial comment. To those we would say, confine yourselves to telling the news and you can make no mistake. Drawing personal conclusions or giving advice is pure editorial.

Those who wish to express their personal conclusions drawn from a news happening, or to give advice, can do so by addressing a letter to the editor for publication.

The Sentinel does not insist that copy be prepared in conformity to its rules for publication, but reserves the privilege of rewriting it. News writing is a rare gift possessed by comparatively few and contributors should not allow their feelings to be hurt by the fact that items are not printed as written by them.

The Sentinel welcomes the submission of news items and trusts that these words will in no way deter anyone from sending them in. The Sentinel would also be pleased to publish more letters by readers expressing opinions upon subjects of general interest. If the ideas are worth while The Sentinel will even go to the trouble of correcting mistakes of grammar and spelling to the best of its ability.

TRIALS OF A NEWSPAPER.

The following from the Eugene Register so ably and fully expresses the policy of The Sentinel that we give it space:

As was to have been expected, the recent libel suit against the Register has been dropped. There will probably be others, and it is likely that their result will be about the same. The Register neither courts nor avoids such attacks. It goes on with its business of printing as truthfully and as accurately as possible the news of the day, and if it tramps upon the toes of those who for any reason fear publicity it is willing to answer for its acts. The Register believes that the people are entitled to the truth, and if telling it means the enmity of those who do not want the truth to be told, then it must incur such enmities.

The Register has no private axes to grind. It has no desire to injure any legitimate enterprise or any honest person. Its business is to print the news of the day as accurately and truthfully as it can be obtained, and it proposes to print the news without first asking anyone's permission. If the people do not want this kind of a newspaper then let them look elsewhere.

Libel suits against an honest newspaper are usually either attempts to intimidate or attempts to cripple. The Register does not propose to be intimidated, and it does not believe it is in any danger of being crippled.
