IS UNCONSTITUTIONAL SAYS JUDGE OF TAX LAW

But Taxpayers' Exultation Is
Only for Day

LAW FORMING BASIS OF DECISION FOUND TO HAVE BEEN REPEALED BY ELECTORS.

After considerable fuss on the part of tax collectors to inform taxpayers as to the provisions of the new tax law passed by the last legislature and indignantly expressed dissatisfaction on the part of the taxpayers, Judge McGinn came along and said that the law could not become operative until passed upon by the people, citing the section of the constitution reading as follows:
"No poll or head tax shall be collected in Oregon; no bill regulating taxation or exemption throughout the state shall become a law until approved by the people of the state at a regular general election."
Then after a day of exultation on the part of the taxpayers it is found that the section referred to has been repealed by the people themselves, so it now appears that the taxpayers will have to grit their teeth, obey the law and set up a howl that will get some action in their favor out of the next legislature.
The Portland Taxpayers' association, of which Roger B. Sinnott is president, is behind the move to have the new law declared invalid. The complaint alleges that \$8,480,855.97 in taxes are to be collected and the money will be removed from circulation, although there is no immediate need of the money, that people will be compelled to borrow money at high rates of interest to make their payments and that the law as it stands works hardships on taxpayers.
The provisions of the new law take away the privilege of paying taxes in two semi-annual installments and do away with the 3 per cent discount for payment of the entire amount April 1.
