COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

(Official Publication.)

March 2, 1914. Council met in regular session.

Remonstrance against hitching racks on Washington Avenue referred to street committee.

Matter of a sidewalk on east side of Jenks building near depot referred to the street committee with power to act.

Matter of lights at Cottage Hotel referred to the light committee with instructions to report at next meeting.

Light committee reported, recommending an arc light at the corner of Ninth Street and Gibbs Avenue. On motion report was adopted and light ordered installed.

Treasurer asked that a blank book be furnished for keeping records of the city's finances. On motion the book was ordered as recommended.

The Woman's Club asked permission to erect a public drinking fountain at the corner of Sixth and Main Streets, the city to furnish the water free. On motion the request was granted.

The viewers appointed to view the proposed widening of the alley west of the Lurch property reported, fixing the damages for land to be awarded for opening of said alley at \$175. Mr. Lurch's offer to pay \$25 was accepted on motion and a warrant was ordered

drawn in favor of Oliver Veatch for \$150, payable when time for appeal expires.

The treasurer's comparative statement of the finances of the city for 1912 and 1913 was read and placed on file.

Motion was made that it is the sense of this council that no more street contracts be awarded the Ambrose-Burdal Co. unless their indebtedness to the city for use of the rock crusher and other city property be settled before April 1, 1914.

On motion the mayor and recorder were instructed to sign a modified contract with the telephone company for the installation of the fire alarm system.

On motion the water committee and the water commissioner were authorized to negotiate for the sale of water to prospective consumers within one and one-half miles of the city limits and ordered that all other cases be referred to the council.

On motion G. G. Warner was allowed \$40 as assistant water commissioner.

On motion the city engineer was instructed to make survey and plat necessary to widen East Main Street in front of the Larson property and to make a survey and plat of property necessary to be taken to connect Columbus Court with East Main Street. Meeting adjourned.

Brief News of the Week

Smallpox conditions in South Texas due to the influx of thousands of Mexicans who have crossed the border to escape the revolution, it is declared, have assumed serious proportions.

To the tune of vehement protests from Premier Yamamoto, the upper house of the Japanese parliament reduced the naval estimates from \$80,000,000 to \$45,000,000.

The skeleton of a man believed to be many thousands of years old has been found in the northern part of German East Africa. Indications point to a high state of development.

A judge in Chicago dismissed the case against a man who had been accused of removing a long feather from a young woman's hat. The feather brushed his face and when he remonstrated the girl called him an "old fool."

An agreement has been reached between the socialists, radicals and moderates in Copenhagen, for the extensive reforms in Denmark. Suffrage is granted to women and all electorate qualifications have been abolished.

The Kentucky house of representatives by a vote of 60 to 32 passed a bill providing for the submission to the voters at the election in 1915 of a constitutional amendment providing for a state-wide prohibition.

Twenty-five bodies have been recovered from the ruins of the Missouri Athletic club building. Of these, 21 have been identified. Five bodies are believed to be in the ruins.

The dissolution of the United States Express company was authorized at a meeting of the directors. This action was taken as a result of the recent reduction ordered in express rates by the interstate commerce commission.

An important change in the parcels post regulations was made Monday, on and after which day books will be accepted for transmission as parcel post matter. The rates will be the same as on other articles, except that books weighing eight ounces or less will cost one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

Vice President Marshall accepted an invitation to speak Tuesday night at the annual banquet of the Sons of St. Patrick in Hartford, Conn.

The postal vote plan, which enables voters to cast their ballots by mail, is recommended by Secretary of State Bryan.

Professor Delbet of Paris announces that he has discovered a way in which India rubber can be successfully grafted into the tissues of a living person.

The will of George H. Vanderbilt, as filed for probate, leaves his entire estate, estimated at \$20,000,000, to his widow and only daughter, Cornelia.

The Right Rev. John Scarborough, D. D., Protestant Episcopal bishop of New Jersey, died at his home in Trenton after a short illness. He was in his 83rd year.

Former President Taft began a series of lectures before the law school of the university of Minnesota on Monday. Tuesday evening he was the principal speaker at the annual banquet of the Minnesota Bar association held in St. Paul.

Declaring that he can no longer give his services to the government for the money which the position pays, B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the United States attorney general, has resigned. He has been connected with the department since 1904 and has handled a number of important cases for the government.

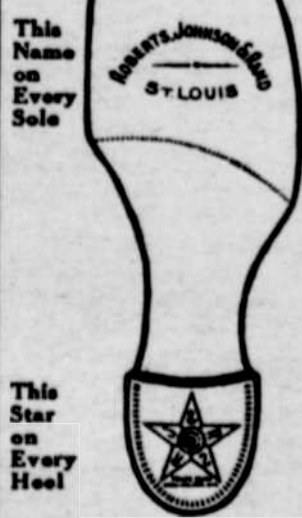
