### Governor, Ex-governors and Mayor Swing Shovels.

Caldwell, Idaho, March 18.—The Governor of the state, two ex-governors, the mayor of Caldwell, the bankers, professional men, merchants and citizens generally, this afternoon donned overalls and shouldered shovels and other implements and went out to mend the roads leading into Caldwell.

By proclamation of the mayor, the day was made a holiday and about 300 amateur road builders, 60 teams and a couple of tractors, to say nothing of dozens of drags assembled on the main highway leading into town from the east and in a few hours put two and a half miles of bad road into perfectly good condition.

Governor Haines, ex-governor Hawley and ex-governor Morrison did yeomen's service with the shovel and then had their pictures taken.

### High School Site Issue at Eugene.

Petitions were filed last week requiring the Eugene school board to submit to the voters of the district an initiated law forbidding the location of a high school at any other location than at the present site, unless the voters of the district shall have specifically sanctioned some other site.

The action is intended to prevent the erection on a new site of the proposed \$110,000 high school, but the bond election and the processes of selling the bonds are not interfered with.

## COW PASTURE WILL BE NO MORE

### NUMBER OF PROGRESSIVE FARMERS JOIN AGRICULTURIST IN EXPERIMENT.

An experimental method of crop rotation is planned by a number of the progressive farmers of the community with the assistance of Floyd W. Rader, the new County Agricultural Expert, who visited the city last week. It is hoped that by this rotation the producing powers of every acre of soil will be increased from eight to ten times, and at the same time provide green feed during the dry summer months.

It means the death knell for the cow pasture as the plan is to feed the cow rather than let her feed herself. Mr. Rader says that it is his belief that the chief trouble with valley farmers has been that they have exhausted most of their energies in avoiding work.

The plan developed by Mr. Rader and the local dairymen involves the planting of fodder crops that will ripen in succession during the summer. For instance, rye and vetch will be planted in the fall. These crops will ripen in May and will be fed to the cattle during May and early June. They will be followed with a crop of Canada field peas, peas and oats, planted in March, which will ripen on June 1, and will carry the cattle through July. After this a crop of fodder corn will be "soiled off" before it is ripe during August, and before the corn is actually cut a crop of rape will be planted after the last cultivation on the same land, and this will come on in August. A second cutting of clover is planned to last through August and September.

The green feed not only makes possible the feeding of more cows, but it results in greater production of milk. In addition, the rotation of crops that can be effected with these products, will enrich the land rather than wear it out. Added to this rotation is the possible use of the silo, which will serve not only as a reserve for winter feed but will tend to tide over from one crop to another in case of weather difficulties or delays.

### Statement and Platform of George G. Gross, Democratic Candidate before the Primaries for the Office of County Commissioner.

Realizing the fact that Lane County taxes are entirely too high, if elected to the office of county commissioner I shall use every endeavor, consistent with good government to lessen the burden and rate of taxation. I am in favor of strict economy in every business issue coming before the county court and will adhere to the policy of economy first, last and always.

I believe in good roads over all the county and not in scenic highways in parts of the county and bottomless roads elsewhere. I believe in strict economy in the building of roads and that a county, the same as any individual, should receive a dollar's worth of work for each dollar expended.

Realizing the fact that many commissions, carrying with them high salaries are useless, I am in favor of doing away with said commissions and thereby making taxes less.

Believing that the farmers of Lane County are competent to do their farm work and that the housewives are competent to do their housework and can their fruit without outside expert aid, I am in favor of doing away with the county farm expert, thereby saving the county the \$2,000 salary per annum paid him.

Believing that the average school teacher, aided by his school directors and assistance of the county school superintendent, is able to handle the school affairs of his school district, I favor abolishing the four county school supervisors of the county, thereby saving \$6,480 annually to the taxpayers.

The county poor farm and buildings cost Lane County \$20,125. To care for the county poor farm in 1913 cost \$15,807.62. I believe the county poor are costing too much for maintenance, much of which is due to poor management and unbusinesslike methods. We must care for the county poor, however, I believe in doing so along more economical lines than heretofore have been pursued.

The amounts of taxes collected in Lane County during the past seven years and for each year was as follows, to wit:

This I believe too rapid a stride even for progressive Oregon and I believe in cutting expenditures so that taxes will hereafter decrease rather than increase.

If elected to the office I seek, I will ever stand ready to listen and carefully consider all petitions, suggestions and recommendations coming from the farmers, business men and taxpayers of Lane County.

## IS OFFERED \$35,000 BUT STICKS TO JOB

Having refused an offer of \$35,000 for his rights in a vacuum pump which he has just patented, Ed Thayer of Eugene, is holding onto his job as switchman in the Southern Pacific yards with no intention of giving it up under any circumstances. Thayer, who is a young man but twenty-eight years of age, says that he worked five years on his invention and that it was in the patent office for two years longer. The patent was granted February 24, this year. He says that of course if he gets \$35,000 or more for his pump it will not be necessary for him to work for the railroad but that he likes the work and feels that he would not be at home elsewhere. Thayer's pump, as described by himself, consists of a cylinder which can be connected up with a spring and easily attached to a stove in which coils are placed to generate the steam which moves a part of the cylinder so that under a certain steam pressure a vacuum is created which does the work of pumping.

The pump is young Thayer's first invention, but he is now working on two others, which he thinks will prove useful articles.

### Creswell Will Swat the Fly.

Creswell has joined the "swat the fly" brigade and will begin activities at once (under the direction of Dr. Clifton N. Hodge of the University of Oregon) to rid itself of that pair of

flies which, if allowed to live and raise their 143,675 bushels of descendants, would render life both precarious and uncomfortable during the summer.

### Neighborhood Gathers to Do Widow's Work.

Forty-seven men and 41 women and children, all neighbors and friends of Mrs. Ollie Williams of Pleasant Hill, whose husband died a short time ago after a lingering illness, gathered at her home Thursday and plowed and seeded forty acres of land and cut and piled a dozen tiers of wood for her. The women of the party prepared and served a splendid meal to the workers. The only reward the corps of willing

helpers received was the heartfelt thanks of the widow and her children and it was the only reward they wished.

### Lower Express Rates in Effect.

State express rates for Oregon were lowered by the ruling of the state railroad commission which went into effect last week. A reduction of practically 20 per cent on all packages ranging from four to fifty pounds was effected. Under the new system it is possible to send a package at its exact weight. The old plan, the blanket weight system, put a package in a certain class when it frequently weighed considerably less, and the shipper paid the difference.
