## GROVE HAS EXCEPTIONAL HEALTH RECORD

CITY PECULIARLY FREE FROM TUBERCULOSIS AND TYPHOID FEVER.

A review of the books of City Health Officer Dr. W. W. Oglesby reveals the fact that but 144 deaths have occurred in this city during the seven years since March 12, 1907. Of this number but thirteen died of tuberculosis, the great white plague. The records compiled by scientists show that one-tenth of the deaths in the United States are the result of this malady, so that Cottage Grove's record is a comfortable percentage below normal. Another record of which the city may be justly proud is the lack of deaths from typhoid fever. In the past seven years but three cases have been reported to the city health officer and each of those was contracted elsewhere and brought here for treatment. Not a single case has originated here. A study of the list shows that deaths have been due to the following causes: Pneumonia 13; cancer 8; apoplexy 8; tuberculosis 13; heart trouble 16; liver trouble 3; accident 5; kidney trouble 9; paralysis 4; intestinal trouble 18; old age 7; suicide 1; miscellaneous 39.

Offsetting the 144 deaths during the past seven years there have been 336 births, or more than twice as many births as deaths. Of the 336 births 157 were girls and 179 boys.

## CHURCHES ARE PREPARING FOR EASTER

The churches of the city are making special preparations to celebrate Easter Sunday with special services. To this end fitting music, recitations and talks will be given and the churches will be elaborately decorated in keeping with the Easter season. In the Methodist church an elaborate musical service will be rendered in the evening. The program appears elsewhere. In the Christian church the morning sermon will deal with the resurrection and its meaning and Mrs. Fagan will sing the ever beautiful "Palms." The Sunday school of that church will give an entertainment composed of Easter drills, songs and recitations. The Presbyterian Sunday school is preparing a program of much interest and the morning sermon will develop the theme "The Ascension."

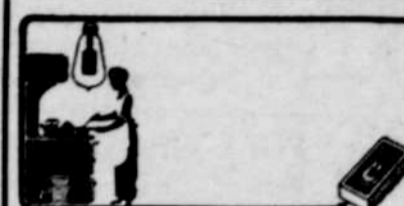
## THREATENED PENALTY MAY BE EVADED
