CITY HAS FIFTH OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS OF MARCH
The report of the county health officer for March shows that during that month 36 births and 23 deaths occurred in the county. Of this number eight of the births were in this city while five of the deaths were here. This is an average, for births and deaths, of about 30 per cent of all births and deaths occurring in the county during that month. Of those dying, the ages of the five out of the five were above 62, while the fifth was 43 years of age.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS
(Official Publication)
April 6.—Roll called and all members present.
Minutes read and approved.
Report of library board read and placed on file.
The water committee reported on application for the extension of mains on Ninth Street. On motion was ordered that the two-inch pipe taken up from Gibbs Avenue to 9th Street and same replaced by a four-inch wood pipe, the four-inch wood to be extended north on Ninth Street far enough to supply all the residents on Ninth Street.

The matter of extending the main of North Douglas Street was referred to the water committee to power to act.
The recorder was instructed to set up the city's contract with J. E. Young for water for the ice plant in order to determine who owns the water rights on the grounds that the water produced would not be sufficient to justify the expense.
The matter of removing the house from Churchill's property on Highway out into the street and a four-inch main was referred to the water committee with power to act.
On motion a warrant was drawn on the library fund in favor of the library board for the entire amount of money in the fund.
On motion the matter of fees for attorney and doctor in the Stevens case suit was referred to the next settlement.
On motion it was ordered that the city recorder accept Ambrose Co.'s note for \$831.00, drawing 1 cent interest dating from the date the warrant drawn for the fund payment on Pacific Highway, due at hand, being in settlement for the contract for the use of the rock and steam roller owned by the city, note to be held until the next paying contract is completed.

On motion it was ordered that permission be granted the Southern Company to grade Lane Street across the depot so that approach can be to the loading track which is to be constructed.
Meeting adjourned to April 13.
