WORK FOR MEN.

Ten days ago a men's mass meeting was held in Cottage Grove under the auspices of the Oregon Social Hygiene Society.

If this meeting taught anything it taught that an enemy to human happiness more dangerous than whisky, more insidious than consumption, is stalking abroad in the land and that we calmly and complacently sit by and allow it to do its deadly work, a large proportion of the men and women of the country even aiding and abetting it.

The enemy is ignorance—ignorance of the functions of the procreative organs of the human race, ignorance of what terrible havoc is being wrought by their misuse.

The purpose of the Oregon Social Hygiene Society is to spread intelligence on problems of social hygiene.

When school girls must cease their studies to become the mothers of babes, and cannot name the fathers of those babes; when young men fail in their studies because they have done things which they would not have done had they had proper counsel from their parents; when natural functions of the body are allowed to frighten the boy and unnatural ones are held up to him as necessary; when wives are barren because of indiscretions of the husband; when everything that is natural reaches the young man and young woman from the most unnatural and distorted sources; when fathers with girls of their own smile at the indiscretions of the brothers of these girls; when boys are allowed to believe that it is not manly, that it is dangerous to lead ascetic lives; when our insane asylums and schools for the blind are being filled with innocent victims of the red plague; when our brothels are being supplied with the victims of the boys who were taught that they must sow their wild oats; when God's method of giving life becomes the instrument of Satan; when a physician at a public meeting states that half the physicians of the country would be put out of business if the red plague were stamped out, it seems that there is work for such an organization as the Oregon Social Hygiene Society.

This society is composed largely of men, and its work is a work for men—a work for strong men, for earnest men, for moral men, for the fathers of the growing generation. Every such man should proffer his aid in this great campaign of sexual education.

CALLING THE LEGISLATOR.

The recent action of a committee of Portland taxpayers in issuing a call to twelve leading citizens of that city to submit themselves as candidates for the Legislature is highly commendable. If such action were taken in every legislative district at every election the personnel of the Legislature would be greatly improved and that body would soon be relieved of the odium now attached to it.

There is no lack of candidates on every ticket for most every office to be voted upon at the coming primary election, and the elector who picks the best one of the bunch for each office has himself a gift of discernment that qualifies him for most any office within the gift of the people.

Fred S. Bynon, Secretary of the Salem Commercial Club, was forced into the race for Labor Commissioner at the last moment, but that's no sign he won't come out first. He is a live one and believes that labor can be amply safeguarded without putting industry out of business.

Lane County is practically certain to lose one of its best Circuit Judges by the election of Hon. Lawrence T. Harris to the Supreme bench. Geo. M. Brown of Roseburg for Attorney General also seems a likely candidate.

A stick-in-the-mud will never get very far in Oregon.

various candidates, while a number of new contestants have entered the race and are out to win. In fact, everything indicates that it is going to be one of the most interesting and closely contested campaigns ever made in Oregon, not excepting some of the political battles of former days, when men, both great and near great, were in the field. However, this contest differs from the

As stated before, every special offer made in this contest will favor the early hustler. The hustler can not lose by turning in subscriptions as rapidly as received.

When Votes Are Counted.

All votes that are received by the contest manager before 5 p. m. Monday days before publication will be counted and credited to the standing of the contestant in the next issue of the paper.
