Local Ball Tossers Win by 3 to 1 Score

MEDLEY, NEW TWIRLER FOR LOCALS, HAS SPEED TO BURN AND PROVES PUZZLE TO ANTAGONISTS.

In the snappiest, fastest and cleanest games ever played on Midway grounds, Eugene, Cottage Grove won from the Eugene Atlas team Sunday by a score of 3 to 1. The game was played in the remarkably short time of one hour and twenty-two minutes. Another peculiar feature was that not a single dispute arose over the umpires' decisions. But one base on balls was given during the game.

This was the opening game for Eugene in the Upper Willamette Valley League. The game had been well advertised, but due, no doubt, to the threatening dark clouds and an occasional shower during the day the attendance was not large.

Both men attempted to steal and were thrown out by the mighty wing of Earl McKivitt, the Atlas finger, had excellent control and while ten hits were made off his delivery, he managed to keep them well scattered. He did not issue a single pass to first during the entire nine frames.
