THE LEGISLATIVE SITUATION.

Having a candidate for the Legislature on both the Republican and Democratic tickets, with a possibility of another on the Socialist ticket, Cottage Grove is somewhat interested in the legislative situation.

The Democratic candidate is the only contestant for that position in the entire county. With three places on the ticket to be filled, The Sentinel feels that it can safely predict the nomination of the lone candidate.

Candidates for other offices who have had occasion to feel of the pulse of the voters of the County find that there is a well defined sentiment for apportioning the representation from a geographical standpoint. By this arrangement one of the positions is conceded to Cottage Grove, provided this city itself gives its candidate anything like the vote that it is expected to give a home candidate. Under the same circumstances and for the same reason one position is practically conceded to Junction City, from which place F. N. O'Connor is the candidate.

The third place on the ticket lies between Eugene and Springfield, which two cities for all political purposes are so situated geographically that they might well be considered one community. Eugene is certain of the Senatorship, and there is a well defined belief that it will also land the other position in the lower house. In fact, but a short time ago the nomination of Allen Eaton was the only one that seemed a cinch. In the last few weeks the condition has changed some and many think the contest between Eaton and Dillard will be close. Because of his experience and the friendship which he has openly shown for Cottage Grove, Eaton has strong support here. He is the only one of the old members who is a candidate for reelection.

Springfield is expected to vote solid for its two candidates, but the sentiment throughout the County at this time is that Springfield will either be left out entirely or may win one of the places by leaving either Cottage Grove or Junction City out of the reckoning.

Of course, there is the probability that Eugene will capture two positions and Springfield one, thus leaving the balance of the County out in the cold, but the feeling prevails that one position will go to Eugene, one to Junction City and one to Cottage Grove, always provided that the two latter cities do not fail to give their candidates a handsome vote.

To the credit of Eugene it should be said that the move to divide the representation geographically originated with prominent citizens of that city.

H. C. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill is expected to poll a strong rural vote but has no strong local community to give him a large nucleus to start with.

The joint Senatorship goes to E. D. Cusick of Albany without opposition.

For the Lane County Senatorship there are two candidates, I. H. Bingham and M. Vernon Parsons, both of Eugene. Mr. Parsons is now a member of the lower house. Mr. Bingham has served before in the upper house and was urged into the race this time by those who were not pleased with the Parsons candidacy. While neither seems to be an overly popular candidate, the odds seem to favor Bingham because of past experience and presumed superior ability. On account of his former residence here it is expected that he will get a large vote out of Cottage Grove. This contest is likely to be a close one.

FLOWER THIEVES.

A news story in The Sentinel last week recited complaints made by residents of the city because of the stealing of flowers by miscreants who even destroy plants and bushes in their greed to appropriate the property of others.

Cottage Grove can never hope to have pretty yards, flower gardens and parkings until the flower thieves can be made to desist. Household can not be expected to nurse and coddle expensive and delicate plants only to have them ruthlessly crushed and destroyed by people with utter disregard for the rights and feelings of others. There are few flower growers in Cottage Grove who would not be more than pleased to give to those so unfortunate as to be without. It is, therefore, a shame that their efforts to beautify the city should be discouraged and made exceedingly difficult by those too ornery or good-for-nothing to raise flowers of their own—those who take a very ugly manner of showing admiration of the beautiful. A few arrests would prove salutary and might result in diminishing the reprehensible practice referred to.

A somewhat minor office, but one of considerable importance, is that of Labor Commissioner and Factory Inspector. The present incumbent is O. P. Huff, a Lane County man, formerly railroad agent at Irving.

Inquiry among Cottage Grove industries indicates that he has made a satisfactory official. His policy has been to enforce the laws as he finds them regardless of consequences to anyone or anything. He believes that to be the proper way to prove their value or to attract enough attention to them to force their repeal if valueless or harmful.

There are four candidates for the republican nomination in the coming election, but the contest seems to lie between Mr. Hoff and J. A. Madsen of Portland. As between the two men Lane County should by all means give her candidate a unanimous vote.
