KEEP THE FAITHFUL EMPLOYEE.
 It is of paramount importance to Oregon to have at Washington trusted and tried public servants. One such is W. C. Hawley, member of Congress from this district.

The Sentinel does not pretend to say that Mr. Hawley is the ablest Congressman at Washington nor that his name appears among the list of leaders. We do not think that Mr. Hawley makes claim to any such distinction. But we do say, without fear of successful contradiction, that none attends to the details of his office more painstakingly, that none has been on the right side of progressive legislation more frequently and that none has taken greater interest in making conditions such that the vast unsettled regions of Oregon might be settled with honest, industrious homesteaders.

The Sentinel does not believe that even an opponent can honestly say that an abler man opposes him. Such being the case, it is our duty to return him to the halls of Congress. Oregon will never take its proper place in the affairs of the nation so long as we change our congressmen every second or third election. Just as long as we keep sending untried and inexperienced men to Washington, just so long must we bow to the will of the East which returns its congressmen term after term.

COMMISSIONED TO DEATH.
 Those who are elected to the Legislature may be relieved of the task of abolishing a lot of useless commissions by an initiative measure proposed by Wm. A. Carter, candidate for governor. Few people realize to what an extent Oregon is commissioned and for that reason we print one section of the proposed initiative measure, which gives information that is startling. It reads:

On and after July 1, 1915, the following state departments, state boards, commissions, state offices and commissioners, shall be consolidated, to-wit: The Board of Inspection of Child Labor shall be consolidated and merged into the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics and Inspector of Factories and Workshops; the State Desert Land Board, the State Water Board and the Bureau of Mines and Geology shall be consolidated with and merged into the State Land Board; the Board of Sheep Commissioners, the Stallion Registration Board, the State Livestock Sanitary Board shall be consolidated with and merged into the State Veterinary Board; the Board of Portage Railway Commissioners shall be consolidated with and merged into the Railroad Commission of Oregon. The State Architect, State Board of Immigration Commissioners, the State Immigration Agent, Board of Commissioners for Licensing Sailors' Boarding Houses, Commission to Investigate Co-operative Agricultural Societies and Rural Credits in Europe, State Board of Examination and Registration of Graduate Nurses are hereby abolished. The State Tax Commission shall be reduced to three members consisting of the Governor, Secretary of State, and State Treasurer, who shall serve as such without additional compensation.

THE LEGISLATIVE SITUATION.
 With the primaries but eight days away it almost appears that two nominees for the lower house will come from Eugene. Allen Eaton seems absolutely certain of nomination and W. B. Dillard seems but few laps behind. The acquaintance secured as county school superintendent is standing him well in hand now. In the event that two nominees come from Eugene, no one seems certain as to where the third will come from, other than that according to reports from reliable sources it seems to lie between F. N. O'Connor of Junction City, H. C. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill and Cottage Grove's candidate. Unless Springfield's candidates have strength that does not appear on the surface that city will be among the communities left out in the cold. Mr. Wheeler, with a formidable rural support, is considered very much in the running, and there is a possibility that Eugene will be the only city to secure representation. It is up to Cottage Grove, Springfield and Junction City to give their candidates solid support if they are to be considered when the votes are counted.

Chas. A. Johns, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, has shown that he has qualities of judgment that qualify him for the position he seeks. He is making his campaign in the newspapers, where his advertising will be read by every voter who is intelligent enough to be affected by anything a candidate might say. Gus. C. Moser is another candidate for the same office who shows considerable of the same kind of judgment. Both of these men are usually named among the three candidates most likely to win, the latter usually being placed first or second.

Lane County has one of the most popular candidates in the running—Lawrence T. Harris for the Supreme Bench—and his popularity at home should be demonstrated by an unanimous vote. For a dignified, common sense political pronouncement, that of W. W. Calkins published elsewhere, is the best it has been the pleasure of The Sentinel to print in this campaign.

Robert A. Booth of Eugene, having no opposition, will be nominated for the United States Senate—and most likely would be, anyway.

REPUBLICAN VOTERS SHOULD BEWARE
 Party Should Be Represented on National Committee By a Republican

The Republicans of Oregon are entitled to have a Republican named as the National Republican Committeeman from this State. C. W. Ackerson, who claims to be a Republican, is a candidate. He registered as a Progressive January 8, 1914. Then signed petition of H. W. Coe to be Progressive National Committeeman. Then cancelled his registration as a Progressive and registered as a Republican and immediately filed his candidacy for membership on Republican National Committee. Has been an intimate and convenient understudy of the Progressive National Committeeman and seems now to be in combination with him in an attempt to shanghai the Republican organization. His candidacy is being actively backed by parties hostile to the Republican party and having personal interests and private personal grudges to serve. His erratic and excitable temperament has frequently led him to flood the columns of the press with violent attacks upon the Republican party and vicious personal abuse of prominent Republicans and life-long residents of the State.

It is a grave abuse for parties who are not Republican to register as such. It is a graver abuse for outsiders to attempt the capture of a political party to gratify a personal grudge and to promote party discord. It is an abuse against which fair-minded men of all parties will rise in protest. We can never have a reunited party by pushing to the front political hotheads and men who are political reformers simply for the sake of office. Having been a Republican only twenty-four hours when he announced his candidacy for the highest honorary position in the gift of the party, is some indication of what Mr. Ackerson's motive was in registering as a Republican. As Hon. Ralph E. Williams is the only Republican who is a candidate for Republican National Committeeman, we feel warranted in urging all loyal Republicans in the state to give him their earnest and enthusiastic support.
