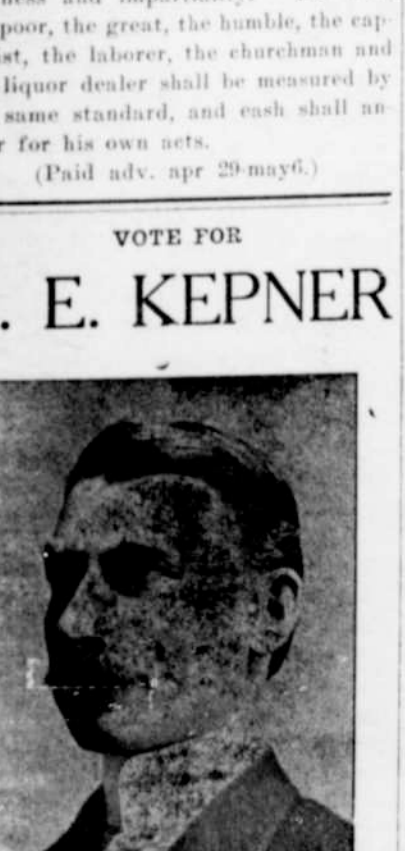

He voted against New Tax Law in Senate and favors payments semi-annually without penalty. He stands for Economy and Efficiency and Dignified Law Enforcement.

Synopsis of Record and Platform
I was born and reared upon a farm in Buffalo County, Wis., educated myself by my own efforts, and have practiced law in Portland since June 1, 1891. I have always taken an active part in public affairs, and have held several official positions.
I stand by my own record as State Senator at the last session of the legislature. I worked and voted against the new tax law, and favor a law making taxes payable semi-annually, without penalty.
Only five of the laws passed at that session were referred to the people by referendum petitions; four of these the people approved by overwhelming majorities, and I voted for them; the fifth was almost as badly defeated, and I had voted against it in the legislature.
I worked and voted for Senator Markey's minimum wage bill for women, providing for an impartial commission to fix the maximum hours of labor and the minimum amount of pay.
I favor a similar law providing for an impartial commission without compensation, to fix the maximum hours of labor for men in the various industrial occupations; this in preference to a flat eight-hour law.
I favor further good roads legislation with state aid, so that we may have cheaper transportation from the farms and producers in every direction.
I favor the reduction of taxes by consolidation of various commissions, or the abolishment thereof, and placing their duties into the hands of the State Board, and by the reduction of the expense of conducting the various departments of the state.
I favor suitable appropriations for our State Educational Institutions, and the continued improvement of our great bulwark—the public school system.
And above all, I favor the vigorous and efficient enforcement of all the criminal statutes, including those regulating and prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, and this I shall do with firmness and impartiality. The rich, the poor, the great, the humble, the capitalist, the laborer, the churchman and the liquor dealer shall be measured by the same standard, and each shall answer for his own acts.

The Real Menace Confronting Popular Government.
In Lane County, as elsewhere in the state, registration is extremely light. The books have been open for months. The voters have been urged, implored and commanded to go and prepare themselves to vote. They have been thundered at by the newspapers and from the pulpit. They have had it flung into their ears that important questions are coming up for settlement and that the success of popular government must depend upon the interest that is shown by the people in public questions. They know that they must choose candidates to represent them in making laws and administering them. But in spite of all this registration has been so light as to cause surprised comment from all over the state.
The voter who neglects to register has no one to blame but himself if anti officials are chosen. He has no one to blame but himself if taxes are higher than they should be. He has no one to blame but himself if the affairs of state, county and city are not managed as economically as they should be. He has no one to blame but himself if poor laws are passed and good ones fail of passage. For he has given proof that he is not interested in the public's business and that he does not care what happens.
The increasing tendency to neglect to register and vote is the greatest danger that confronts the principle of popular government. There are said to be enemies who are actively seeking to settle the direct primary, the initiative, the referendum and the recall. From time to time we are told that schemes are on foot to do away with popular rule. But the real enemy of popular government is the apathy of the voters. If it ever fails it will be because the majority of the people cease to take interest in public affairs and fail to register and vote.—Eugene Register.

To the Republican Voters of Lane County:
I am a candidate for the Republican nomination for County Judge of Lane County. I have been urged by my friends to make a personal canvass for the nomination, but have not done so. In the first place, I haven't had time and in the second place, it is repugnant to me to make an active personal campaign within my own party.
I have all my life been interested in politics, and believe in the principles of the National Republican party. I have held office in Minnesota as a Republican, and have been a delegate to many Republican Conventions there, both county and state. Since coming to Oregon, over twelve years ago, I have represented Lane County in the Legislature as a Republican, for three sessions; once as Representative, and twice in the Senate.
I believe I am qualified for the office of County Judge, both as Judge of Probate, and as Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. As Probate Judge, the County Judge should have some legal qualifications, as all the property in the county, sooner or later, passes through the Probate Court; and as a member of the Board of County Commissioners, he should have good business qualifications, as the County Court expends all the money collected as taxes, and the matter of the sober discretion and business judgment of that body is of vital importance to every taxpayer.
I was engaged in the active practice of law for seventeen years in Minnesota, and have been in close touch with the practice in this state during my residence in Lane County.
I consider the Republican nomination for County Judge as practically equivalent to an election; and if elected, I shall strive to give the county an efficient, economical business administration, and to see that every section of the county, and every individual and business interest are treated with ab-

olute impartiality; and I believe I have the training and ability to do so. I have no business interests of any kind that will conflict with my giving my undivided attention to the business of the county, and that will be my business if elected.
I have made no promises of any kind to any individual or community, and shall be free to act independently as occasion arises. Although a Republican, as County Judge, I should know no party or faction, but represent all alike.
I look at the matter as largely a business proposition, so far as the voters are concerned, and if, in the judgment of the Republican voters, one of my opponents shall be considered as better qualified than I for the office, I shall cheerfully acquiesce in that decision.

ELBERT BEDE.
Having been repeatedly importuned by those interested in my candidacy for the legislature as to when I am going out on a campaign tour, I wish to make the following explanation:
In event of my election I will be between \$150 and \$200 out of pocket in performing the duties of the office. I feel that this amount is really more than I can afford to sacrifice, therefore, I will incur no campaign expenses.
I am a candidate against my own wishes and judgment, but I feel that every man who is capable owes a certain duty to his state that he should attempt to perform when called upon, and that no one can consistently criticize the acts of the Legislature who is not himself willing to attempt to better conditions. I, therefore, yielded to what I believed to be a genuine demand for my candidacy. If the voters express a belief in my ability to serve them, I shall do my best to prove that their faith has not been misplaced, but I have not asked for a vote nor am I going to. I believe the standard of the Legislature has already been lowered by those who have belittled the position by groveling for the favors of the electors, and I will not be likewise guilty. I believe that no man should be elected to that position who is not well enough known by his works to be elected without making a campaign.
I have no personal or mercenary motives for wishing to serve in the Legislature. Securing the position means to me merely the securing of political recognition for the city of which I happen to be a resident and the privilege of helping to shape the destiny of the greatest state in the Union, but if I am among the five who are defeated for the nomination, I will take no umbrage. I prefer editorial work to politics; I have no political ambitions to nurse; and if not elected to become a member of the state's law making body, I feel certain that I will, in my newspaper work, do more for the upbuilding and advancement of the state than will a majority of those who go to Salem—possibly more than I would myself do as a legislator.
Before becoming a candidate I had the assurance of numerous prominent citizens of Eugene that I could depend upon a large vote from that city. Particularly urgent letters came from friends of the University and it is partly to demonstrate that there is a warm and friendly feeling in Eugene for Cottage Grove that I am now a candidate.
Some have criticized me for not taking space in the voters' pamphlet. An explanation: While the cost of getting into the pamphlet is trifling, I told my friends in advance that I would spend no money in an attempt to get a job that does not pay the expense of performing the duties attached thereto and that if money was spent it must be by those interested in my election. For that reason I had no space in the pamphlet and have had no publicity whatever except such as my friends and the newspapers have seen fit to give me. This has been considerable and, in my opinion, has been more valuable than would have been space in the pamphlet.
Cottage Grove is geographically entitled to a candidate and I have little doubt of my nomination. If elected I will not betray a trust. If defeated my trust in the good judgment of the voters will not be lessened. Three good men could be nominated were I defeated.
