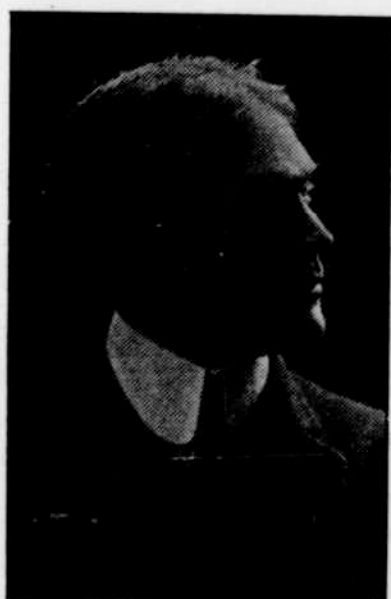

Charles L. McNary FOR JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT.

(Now on the Bench.)

Justice McNary was born of pioneer parents on a farm in the Willamette Valley forty years ago. After acquiring his early education in the common schools and his collegiate and legal education by supporting himself, he entered upon his profession in Salem, where he enjoyed one of the largest law practices in the state.

For several years he served as Assistant District Attorney for the Third Judicial District, and won the reputation of being a fearless and capable prosecutor. For six years, he was the Dean of the Willamette College of Law, and made it one of the ranking colleges of the West.

Reared with the common class he has always been a staunch champion of their cause. During his career as a Justice of the Supreme Court he has endeavored to interpret the law as a living progressive science, rather than as a rule too old to be corrected if found inapplicable to present day conditions. It was Justice McNary who wrote the forceful and much discussed dissenting opinion in the State vs. E. S. J. McAllister. Defining the duties of courts in this opinion he said in part:

"The value of law is its proximity to reason, its certainty and universality."

The abuse in the administration of law is to adhere blindly to a rule that savors of inequity simply because it is a judicial decision. The first duty of a court is to decide the law correctly so far as it lies within the human mind. The next duty is to smite that rule of human action which is found to be unjust, however well it may be buttressed by precedent.

The owner himself of one of the finest farms in the Willamette Valley, Justice McNary is deeply interested in agriculture development. He is now, and has been for a number of years past, President of the Salem Fruit Union, an organization engaged in developing the fruit industry of the state.

This information is given to the public by members of the bar who acquired their legal education under the instruction of Justice McNary, and who appreciate his enviable record on the bench.
