But since you suggest it I will gladly go on record again as being strongly in favor of considerable road development in Southern Lane County. I look upon the country south of Creswell as a distinct district to itself and the money that is derived from taxation should be returned there for development of that territory instead of being used to benefit another community. There are a number of important roads that should be put in first class shape and all side roads and by roads should get their just allotment. There is one road in particular of which there is crying need for improvement and that is what is known as the Lorane road. There is nothing fair or just in keeping the Lorane people bottled up without an outlet in any direction.

In order to get desirable roads I do not consider it at all necessary to increase taxes or in any way make roads a burden to the taxpayer. We won't get good roads over night, but by persistent adherence to systematic and business-like methods; by taking care of the roads we build; instead of kissing them goodbye for four or five years after they are built, and allowing good work to represent a total loss, spend a dollar now and then at the right time and in an intelligent manner for maintenance; by taking a stitch in time we will save nine and after a few years of systematic supervision we will wake up some morning and find our road and your road and the other fellow's road in pretty good shape.

Allen Eaton's Statement.

Allen Eaton, whose statement to the voters follows, is a native Oregonian of pioneer parents who was first elected to the Legislature from Lane County in 1906. He has been a member of the House continuously since that time. He will be, if elected, the oldest member of the Oregon Legislature in point of service, though one of the youngest in years. This is probably the longest unbroken period of service in the history of the Oregon House of Representatives. He is a Republican but has twice received the nomination from the Democrats, the members of that party having written his name into their ballot. Mr. Eaton says: "The reason I am asking again for the Republican nomination for State Representative is that I want to help in the most important work that the next Legislature will consider."

The greatest need in Oregon at this time is a legislative session which will be so fair, so efficient and so economical that it will commend itself as an institution to the people of the state. The people do not want more legislation, they want less of it. Above all they want an actual demonstration that the Legislature is a deliberative body where all matters will receive fair and careful consideration. It doesn't matter who is elected to the House if the methods of doing business are not improved, the Legislature will fall short of what is expected of it and what it should do.
