**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**  
(Official Publication)  
April 4, 1914. Mayor and all councilmen present.  
A petition for a four inch water main on second street was read and referred to the water committee.  
A petition of the property owners on First street asking permission to improve the street at their own expense without the city letting a contract for the same was read and on motion granted on condition that the work be done on the grade established by the city engineer and under his direction, and that the city assume no responsibility on account of property owners not paying their share of the improvement.  
Ordinance 401, being for the improvement of Eighth street from Adams Avenue to Gibbs Avenue was read first and second time. On motion the ordinance was amended to read "to the north line of Gibbs Avenue to the north line of Washington Avenue." On motion rules were suspended and the ordinance read third time and passed as amended.  
Ordinance 402, being an ordinance for the pavement of Pacific Highway from Main street to Nellis Place was read third time and passed.  
Ordinance 403, being an ordinance for the improvement of Pacific Highway from Nellis Place south to the city limits, was read a third time and passed.  
The Marshal's report was read and placed on file.  
On motion the city recorder was instructed to ascertain from William Landess the amount due him for rental for the right of way of the pipe line and to issue a warrant for the same and turn the keys of the reservoir over to him.  
The water committee made a verbal report on the condition of the Landess reservoir. On motion the same was referred to the council for investigation and action at a future date.  
The light committee made a majority and minority report, the majority report being in favor of postponing action on the proposition of the light company for a new contract until after the investigation by the Railroad Commission, and also against entering into a 10-year contract. The minority report recommended that the council accept the light company's proposition and enter into a new contract with the company in accordance with their proposition. On motion to accept the minority report the vote was tied and the mayor cast the deciding vote in the negative.  
On motion the fire chief was instructed to make a list of wrenches, spanners and other equipment needed for the hose carts and to instruct recorder to order same.  
On motion the Methodist church was granted permission to put in a platform and otherwise improve that portion of the King lot south of the bridge, said improvement to be removed at any time ordered by the council.  
On motion the matter of a thirty-foot street east of the Cottage Grove Manufacturing Co. and the Ice Plant properties was referred to the city attorney to report at the next meeting.  
On motion the city recorder was instructed to consult with the city engineer and order the pipe for the extension of the main on North Ninth street.  
On motion the matter of rolling North Lane street was referred to the mayor with power to act.  
On motion the marshal was instructed to proceed at once with the collection of the dog taxes.
