Electors Did Not Realize that Primary is More Important in Oregon Politics Than in General Election November.

Booth, Harris Are Warmly Endorsed

Booth and Bennett Are Favorites for Governor on Republican and Democratic Tickets—Local Legislative Candidates Endorsed.

Half the registered vote was cast at the Cottage Grove primary. About a third of this was for Booth, who failed to realize that state and county where one party has the balance of power the primary election is much greater in importance than the fall election.

C. Hawley for congress received a strong endorsement over his opponent, B. F. Jones, and R. A. Booth. United States Senator received all the entire party vote.

Booth, local candidate for the legislature, secured a large vote over all the candidates, although not as large as friends had expected.

C. Moser was the favorite for governor, Crawford coming next. Booth was a big favorite on the democratic ticket. Lawrence T. Harris received a handsome endorsement for the same bench. Geo. M. Brown secured times as many votes for attorney general as his nearest competitor.

BEDE PROBABLY ONE OF NOMINEES FOR ASSEMBLY

Contest Is So Close Canvass of Votes Will Be Necessary to Decide whether Cottage Grove Candidate Is Winner or Loser.

Cottage Grove is assured one place and possibly two on the legislative ticket. Alta King received the nomination of the democratic party, and on the face of the returns Elbert Bede has received the nomination for one of the places on the republican ticket by a very narrow margin. The first returns indicated that Bede had lost by a large vote, but all late returns were in his favor and he rapidly overtook Melvin Fenwick for third place on the ticket. For two days with the precincts of Heeta, Minerva and Sinalaw yet to be heard from he was two votes ahead of Fenwick. When the returns came in from these precincts, the count made by the Eugene Register gave the Grove candidate a lead of twenty-two votes. A count made by the Eugene Guard puts him twelve votes behind.

Mr. Bede's position will not be certain until the votes are canvassed, which will leave the result in doubt for a week or more. Had Cottage Grove given their home candidate the vote that had been expected his nomination would have been a cinch. Eugene gave Cottage Grove's candidate the next position below their own, which was a very pleasing circumstance to Cottage Grove people. Had the election been left entirely to Eugene Cottage Grove's candidate would have been nominated. Creswell also gave a handsome endorsement, being better in proportion than that received at home. The surrounding country also gave large pluralities for the Grove candidate for either first or second place.

Neither of Cottage Grove's legislative candidates got a very strong endorsement at home.

NEW DISCOVERED BUG GROWS FAT ON FRUIT SCALE

Orchards Found Where Insect Has Eradicated Virulent Cases of the Disease—Is Itself in No Way Injurious to the Trees.

Fruit Inspector Will Investigate Beetle

Pintilla Mesilla Is Scientific Name of Tiny Friend of Fruit Growers Which May Save Local Orchardists Many Dollars.

A beetle about half the size of a pin head, that lives on and destroys San Jose scale, has been discovered on a fruit ranch near Eugene by Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart. The scientific name of the insect is pintilla mesilla. It lives under the bark but is itself in no way injurious to the tree.

Mr. Stewart knew of the insect before but had never before heard of it in Lane County. He is going to make a full investigation of the life and habits of the bug and has hopes that its propagative powers may be such that in time it will be able to cope with and entirely eliminate all danger from the scale.

Last year Mr. Stewart discovered an orchard near here in which a most virulent case of scale had been entirely killed off from no apparent cause. He is now of the opinion that the recently discovered insect did the work.

The elimination of danger from scale would be a big thing for fruit growers of the Willamette Valley.

SPEAKER URGES PUPILS TO IMITATE ENERGY OF THEIR ELDERS

Manager of Eugene Commercial Club Surprised at Alladin-Like Erection of School Building.

Great admiration for Cottage Grove's new high school building and the energy of the people who made such a building possible, was expressed by M. J. Duryea, manager of the Eugene Commercial Club, who spoke before the high school assembly upon the occasion of his recent visit to the city.

In his talk he likened the improvement in school buildings to the building of character and urged the young people to take as much pains to improve their characters and the quality of their work as the patrons of the district had taken to provide improved buildings and improved facilities for study.
