FIRST AND SECOND STREETS BEING IMPROVED

Grading and Rolling Are Completed and Crushed Rock Will Be Laid as Soon as Furnished.

The work of macadamizing First and Second Streets, which was undertaken some time ago by the residents along the two streets at their own expense, is going forward rapidly. The grading and rolling is practically completed and the streets are ready for the crushed rock which will be laid as soon as the city puts the rock crusher into operation.

The five blocks from Adams to Quincy Avenues and one block beyond the city limits are being worked on Second Street and five blocks are being improved on First Street. W. B. Cooper is extending the First Street work into his Milapoo Park addition.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE GIRLS DEMONSTRATE WORK ON INVITED GUESTS

In order to show in a tangible manner their appreciation of the handsome new desks made for them by the boys of the manual training department, the girls enrolled in the cookery department of the high school gave an elaborate banquet in honor of the boys Wednesday afternoon. Thirty guests besides the boys, including the members of the faculty, school board, school building committee and their wives, surrounded the board. The menu was made up as follows:

High School Increases; Others Decrease.

During the entire year there has been a decrease in the attendance in the local schools, 620 having been enrolled last year and but 600 this year. The falling off has been in the lower grades, the high school enrollment this year exceeding that of last year by 17. During the month just completed the average attendance, 96.5, was unusually high for this season of the year.
