THE POPULAR VEILS.

Two large patches made of black velvet are placed at suitable points, one to fall at the corner of the left eye and the other at the corner of the mouth. This is a specially becoming veil, flattering to the complexion and very comfortable to wear.

Another beauty veil which is a great favorite in Paris is made of pale heliotrope net and dotted with a couple of black patches. On fair complexions heliotrope tulle is very effective. The same may be said of cobweb tulle in a pale shade of lemon yellow.

For ordinary wear the favorite veil is that made of the fine black silk tulle and dotted all over with white pin spots. Pale rose tulle dotted with white is also admirably becoming, and for women who go in for looking smart one can recommend the new veils in electric blue tulle dotted with black and white pin spots and finished with black velvet patches.

A great deal depends upon the veil. Some of these lengths of fine tulle are real beautifiers. Others merely make the skin look hard or coarse. It is a capital idea to stick to one particular style of veil when it has been found to be becoming.

A Dainty Receptacle For Music Books or Records.

The charming music cabinet illustrated may be carried out in any wood that suits the taste. It is one of the new art designs. Strong County Ticket is Nominated.

County nominations on the Republican ticket have resulted in the choice of a strong array of candidates for the general election in November.

E. H. Bingham, formerly of this city, easily won out over Vernon Parsons for the state senate; E. D. Casick, who had no opposition, is the candidate for Linn and Lane joint senatorship; Allen Eaton was nominated for his fifth successive term in the Legislature and W. B. Dillard, also of Eugene, received the second place. The unofficial count of the votes gives Elbert Bode, the local candidate, a lead of twenty-two over Melvin Fenwick of Springfield for the third position. The final result will not be certain until the vote has been canvassed.

W. W. Calkins is nominated for county judge, Stacy M. Russell for county clerk, C. B. Christensen for sheriff, S. W. Taylor for treasurer, W. W. Branetter for coroner and Mahlon H. Harlow for commissioner.

The only contest on the democratic ticket was for commissioner, which was won by George Gross by a large majority.

Fresh Coat of Kalsomine Given Creswell.

By 3 to 0 Victory Cottage Grove Advances to First Place in Upper Willamette Valley League.

By winning from Creswell Sunday in what is said to have been the very best of many best games played in the Upper Willamette Valley League this season, Cottage Grove took the topnotchers off their perch and is now occupying that exalted position itself.

The kalsomine brush was applied to Creswell and the locals feel that the 3 to 0 victory is sufficient revenge for the 10 to 4 drubbing received from Creswell in the very first game of the season.

The game was as pretty a pitcher's battle as local fans have seen in many a day. Mighty Midget Medley was in the pink of condition as usual and allowed but three dingy hits, while Rankin, his opponent, gave eight. Three of these were of the fielders' choice variety, however, which with faster fielding would have doubled men on bases and would then have only counted for five.

The work of Rankin was good and but for the wobbly support behind him he would have held the locals to a single counter. This would have won the game, however, for Medley was absolutely bullet-proof and was backed up with almost perfect support. A bad heave to first by Smith in the fifth was the only misplay chalked up against his playmates.

The most dangerous period during the game, and the only one in which there was any real danger of Creswell scoring, came in the last stanza, when McDonoh, the first man up, singled past third, went to second on a steal which he got by a hair's breadth, Miller hit to B. Medley, holding McDonoh to his base, Everson went out, Wilhelm to McCargar, McDonoh going to third, where upon his safe arrival B. Rankin ran over and greeted him with a pat on the back, whereup his Umps, Mr. Oakes, declared the runner out because of interference.

The work of McCargar at the initial sack was spectacular and deserving of special mention. During the extermina-

tion of eleven runners in which he assisted, he worked without a slip-up, going into the air and digging them out of the sod with Hal Chase ease.

A backward running catch by Everson off Earl in the fourth was a feature.
