CARNIVAL CARRIES NUMBER OF AMUSEMENT FEATURES

The five-day street fair and carnival to be held June 2 to 6 inclusive, under the auspices of the local fire company promises to be a great success. The use of the grounds at Second and Quincy streets, where the circus was recently held, has been donated by N. W. White and J. H. Hawley. The carnival carries a large number of amusement features including snake charmers, fun factory, glass blowers, the lady that turns to stone, the human spider and Amaza, merry-go-round, Ferris wheel, prize galleries, hoopla racks, etc. Besides these amusement features there is a large collection of monkeys and other animals.

The Sixth Annual Livestock Show will be held on the association's grounds at Union June 4, 5 and 6. Although the show has been steadily increasing in importance during the past four years, it is expected that the exhibition next month will far outclass any predecessors and will compare favorably with the largest similar shows anywhere in the northwest. The main object of the show is to encourage the breeding and feeding of only the best types of livestock for definite purposes. Some of the best stock raised in Oregon is to be found in Union and adjoining counties.

Boys' Short Course in Agriculture. In connection with the regular session of the Oregon Agricultural College, a two weeks' short course in agriculture will be given for boys of the seventh, eighth and high school grades. A special illustrated circular of 16 pages has been issued and mailed to all county school superintendents and to city and village superintendents and principals. Copies may be secured from them or of the director of the summer school, Prof. E. D. Ressler, Corvallis, Oregon.

The circular contains a description of the instruction to be given, full information in regard to railroad rates, cost of board and room, supplies and clothing to be brought by boys, methods of application for enrollment, etc.

Any boy in Oregon is eligible, but not more than one will be accepted from one district of ward school in the towns so long as there are applicants from schools not represented. All applicants must be approved by the county or town superintendent, both as to character and ability to profit by the course. No tobacco users will be accepted.

Many Watch Motor Races.

An unusual degree of interest was aroused locally in the motorcycle races who passed through here Friday enroute from Portland to Roseburg, and a large crowd turned out to see them pass. A thrill of excitement was furnished the crowd when one of the men riding an Indian struck a dog belonging to Van Allison, killing the animal almost instantly and throwing rider and machine. The rider was hurled about twenty feet through the air but was apparently unhurt. The dog was a favorite with the Allison family and was an excellent watchdog.

which will be used as pillars around the Oregon Building at San Francisco next year have been shipped. Of the total number 48 logs to send, seven carloads were shipped from Portland, while 12 logs will be sent by steamer from Coos Bay. The logs have been collected from various sections of the state and were donated by lumber manufacturers. The average weight of the logs is 29,000 pounds and there is only one derrick in the city of Portland which can handle them—that belonging to the O. W. R. & N. Co. on the Albina Dock.

The Oregon Building at the exposition is to be of Grecian architecture on the plan of the Parthenon at Athens. The 48 log pillars surrounding it will be 5 feet in diameter and 45 feet high. They will be dedicated to the 48 states of the Union and each will bear the emblem of a state.

One of the newest and most interesting crops raised in Oregon is the mint from which peppermint oil is extracted. In other sections of the country where this oil is an established product, the oil sells at \$3 to \$4 per pound. Experiments conducted in the vicinity of West Stayton, Marion County, indicate that this crop, when grown under irrigation, will yield at the rate of \$120 per acre. It is expected that a plant for distilling the oil will be erected at West Stayton and a profitable business in the shipping of plants to other sections built up.

Land Frauder Sentenced.

Portland, Ore., May 25.—C. A. Severance, one of five men indicted by the federal grand jury on charges of fraudulent use of the mails in locating settlers on forfeited lands of the Oregon & California Railroad land grant surrendered himself into custody to day, confessed and was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail.

Of the four accused with Severance, O. E. Gross also has confessed and has been sentenced, L. C. Miller is a fugitive, N. D. Cook is resisting removal from San Francisco where he is under arrest, and J. W. Logan is in jail here awaiting trial.
