CANNERY CAPITAL IS INCREASED TO \$5,000

FOUR HUNDRED PUPILS IN GRADE SCHOOL PROGRAM

First Grade Holds Imitation Commencement With Little Tots Arrayed in Regulation Caps and Gowns.

A large and appreciative audience crowded the high school auditorium Wednesday evening to hear the program rendered by the grade schools. Each of the numbers was well done and extremely interesting. The children taking part gave evidence of having been carefully trained and drilled. A happy feature of the program was that so large a number of children took part, nearly four hundred being on the program. The first grade gave a miniature commencement and received real diplomas signifying their graduation from the primary work. They were quaint in their caps and gowns. The second grade gave a song, "Why We Are Happy," and the first and second grades of the West Side school gave a pantomime and song. The third and fourth grades of the East Side gave a silent playlet called "Hunting for a Book." The West Side fourth grade gave a dialog and the fifth grade a scene from "Uncle Tom's Cabin." The West Side fifth and sixth grades sang an Indian lullaby, the seventh grade a song and the eighth a quartette.

RAILROADS WAIT FOR PEOPLE TO LET MONEY GO

No Hope for Further Construction Work Until There Is Sentiment Favoring Reasonable Dividends on Money Invested in Public Utilities.

"The railroads of the nation can do nothing until it is again possible for them to borrow money at a reasonable rate of interest," stated F. L. Burekhalter, division superintendent of the Southern Pacific, in his talk before the Commercial Club during his recent visit here. "While government control is perfectly proper, it has during its experimental stages gone to such an extreme that money is hard to get to be put into railroad construction work. The Southern Pacific is anxious to make many necessary improvements, several cities like Cottage Grove need new depots and new depot sites, but it is impossible for us to give these until conditions right themselves. I believe the tide is slowly turning and that the people, from whom the railroads must get the money to pay the interest on its loans, will in a few years be willing that the railroads make a fair profit to be turned into reasonable dividends and into construction work. The people need no longer fear a 'the-people-be-damned' attitude on the part of the railroads. That time is past. It is now time for cooperation. Only in this way can the railroads prosper and bring prosperity to those dependent upon them."

MRS. A. B. WOOD IS TALKED FOR DIRECTOR

Early Interest Being Taken in Annual School Elections to be Held Monday June 15.

Considerable interest has already been manifested in the annual school election which takes place June 15. One director, a clerk and treasurer are to be elected.

Mrs. A. B. Wood has been prominently mentioned for the position of director. While she has in no way given any encouragement to the movement, when a committee of business men waited on her yesterday and asked permission to use her name, she stated that if elected she would consider it her duty to serve. Of course several who have been mentioned, Mrs. Wood's name has been used the most frequently.

Alta King, whose term as director expires has not as yet decided whether or not he will be a candidate. E. R. Spencer and O. O. Veatch would either one serve if elected.

HAND EUGENE GAME BY RAGGED, LOOSE PLAYING

Locals Go to Pieces for First Time During Season and Boot Ball Around Field While Visitors Chase Tallies Across Home Plate.

Cottage Grove handed Eugene a game on a silver platter on the home grounds Sunday, playing a very ragged field game, making eight misplays and allowing three scores on one lonely hit. Although Eugene outplayed the locals, getting 9 hits, while the locals got but 7, only one of their four runs was earned.

Eugene started the scoring in the first inning when Bryant hit for three sacks after Cairn had fanned, and came in on Bigbee's single. Bigbee was caught off first by a mile, Earl to McCargar, Jamison struck out. In the second Lieualten fanned, Williams singled and stole, Koch fanned, Alexander walked, Tromlitt hit to Damewood, who booted the ball, allowing Williams and Alexander to score on the misplay, Tromlitt also scored before the Grovers got through tossing the ball around the field. In this inning, which was the final one in which Eugene scored, the visitors registered three tallies on one lone hit. The Grovers only run came in the sixth after Medley had rolled out to Tromlitt. Earl hit one clean for three sacks and crossed the pan on Cornell's single, Smith died, Koch to Jamison, Damewood went out on an infield hit. Fast fielding by Eugene kept the boys away from the home station on several occasions when it looked good for scoring. In the ninth Eugene got two men on but were cut down on the paths when Bryant hit to Cornell, who doubled Alexander unassisted.
