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PAVING CONTRACT IS LET TO AMBROSE-BURDSAL CO.

Prices on Hard Surface Macadam is \$1.00 Per Yard; Eighth Street and Pacific Highway South From Main To Be Improved.

Underbidding their competitors on practically every item, the Ambrose-Burdsal Co. was last night awarded the contract for the paving of Eighth Street and Pacific Highway South from Main Street to Nellis Place. The contract was let at a special meeting of the council. The only other company bidding was the Shell & Shell Co. of Eugene. Only one bid for macadamizing Pacific Highway from Nellis Place to the city limits was submitted so the awarding of the contract was held over until the meeting of June 15. In detail the bids were as follows: Ambrose-Burdsal Co. for excavating, on Eighth Street, 40c per square yard; for fill, 60c per yard; paving, \$1.00 per yard; straight curb, 35c per yard; curved curb, 45c per yard; catch basins, \$15 each; 4-in. sewer pipe, laid, 35c; 6-in. sewer pipe, laid, 45c; Shell & Shell, excavating, 40c; fill, 40c; paving, \$1.10; straight curb, 35c; curved curb, 55c; catch basins, \$18; 4-in. sewer pipe, 40c; 6-in. sewer pipe, 50c.

DROPS DEAD WHILE OTHERS ARE AT CHURCH

End Comes to LeRoy Barrett, One of Early Pioneers, While in Chair Taking Foot Bath.

Apparently in his usual fair health when left alone at their little home by his brother, W. W. Barrett, with whom he lived, LeRoy Barrett was found dead upon his brother's return from church Sunday morning. Death was probably caused by heart failure. That he had been dead but a few moments when his brother returned from services and found him is evidenced by the fact that his wet footprints were still upon the floor. He had been taking a footbath and was in his chair when he passed away.

Mr. Barrett was 78 years of age, having been born in Erie County, New York, in 1836. He came west about forty years ago, driving over the southern route through California to Oregon in search of health. He was unmarried and is survived only by his two brothers and a sister, J. K. Barrett and W. M. Barrett, both of this city and Mrs. F. A. Chase of Kansas. The funeral was held Monday afternoon, interment being made in the Masonic cemetery.

DAVE ALEXANDER CHARGED WITH WIFE BEATING

Former Cottage Grove Couple, Now Located at Marshfield, Figure in Police Court News of That City.

A recent issue of a Marshfield paper contained the following under a lurid first page head:

According to several witnesses, David Alexander, proprietor of the Java Coffee house, has a playful amusement he indulged last night to quiet an extent, until Officers J. W. Carter and Walter Richardson arrived on the scene and interrupted the pastime.

One of the witnesses who saw the exhibition, went to the police station and told the officers of the fracas. Alexander was accused of wife beating and those who will appear tomorrow and testify as to what they saw are Mrs. Amanda Alexander, the wife; Anna Anderson, a waitress employed at the Java; J. A. O'Kelly, and Officers Carter and Richardson. The man who is charged with the offense, Mrs. Alexander and Anna Anderson, appeared in court this morning and when Alexander was arrested he pled not guilty.

The alleged offense occurred on the wharf between the Java Coffee house and the store room just across the alley and when the officers arrived they found Mr. Alexander and his wife in the store room. Mrs. Alexander's glasses had been broken and she was in a hysterical condition.

Mr. and Mrs. Alexander came here from Cottage Grove last year and have been conducting the Java since they purchased it of Henry Wells, nearly a year ago. Mr. Alexander, when the case was called today, suggested that the court order a physical examination of his alleged victim by a doctor to find whether there were any bruises on her body, but the court did not make the order and if there is any evidence of that nature it will not be known until the trial is held.

The petition of the Oregon Pacific & Eastern for the vacation of that portion of Washington Ave. between Tenth Street and the Southern Pacific right of way was read, together with the proof of publication of notice and June 15 was set by the council as the time for acting upon the petition.

The bid of Shell & Shell for paving Eighth Street and Pacific Highway and of Ambrose-Burdsal Co. for paving Eight Street and Pacific Highway and macadamizing Pacific Highway South from Nellis Place to the city limits were opened and read and referred to the street committee for examination for report at meeting to be held June 2.
