COUNTY OFFICER ALMOST FINDS LOST BOY FOR KANSAS MOTHER

Peculiar Coincidence in Resemblance of
Name of Cottage Grove Man to That
of Lad Sought.

When County Clerk Stacy Russell
found that there was a man named E.
E. Hale living on the Coast Fork near
Cottage Grove he at first thought that
he was going to be able to make glad
the heart of a mother in Kansas who
had made inquiry of him for her boy
of that name. The young man living on
the Coast Fork, it was found, came from
Kansas, but further inquiry brought
the information that this man's mother
is dead, that his name is Emmet E.
Hale, while that of the lost young man
is Ed. E. Hale, and that his father and
stepmother came to Oregon at the same
time he did and now live at Ashland.

The inquiry, which is from Kensing-
ton, Kans., states that the young man
has not been heard from since he left
several months ago to buy a farm in
Lane County. The father writes that
the mother is rapidly losing her mind
because of worry. As the boy usually
carried a large sum of money with him,
the parents fear he may have met with
foul play. The last heard from him by
his parents he was working in a logging
camp.

sion includes only those varmints upon

is likely that a number were killed that
were not reported.
