

Points for Mothers

The First Teeth.

The moment a spot of decay appears upon a tooth—no matter how young the child may be—that decayed spot should be removed and the hole stopped by a dentist.

If this is not done the decay will quite certainly spread and probably destroy several teeth.

Don't imagine that because they are "only the first set" these teeth do not matter. The first set matters very much. If any of the teeth in decay and fall out too soon the jaw doesn't have the same chance to expand as it would do if the teeth lasted their full time and fell out naturally when the second ones came up under them.

Then, again, many mothers have an idea that the molars (the big back grinding teeth), which appear at the age of about six, are some of the first set and do not need any special attention if they show signs of decay. They are not. They are some of the second set—the permanent set—and if they decay and have to come out they will never be replaced. If the decay spots in the first set are neglected they will very likely infect these permanent teeth.

POTATO NOTES.

To secure an early supply of new potatoes next season plant the tubers of any good early variety in pots and start them in the house. Four or five inch pots can be used, filled only about two-thirds full of soil, leaving room for a top dressing of soil to be supplied as the plants grow, after the manner of hilling up potatoes when grown in the garden. One potato is sufficient for each pot.

Time the planting so the plants will be well started in the pots when they are to be transplanted in the garden at the time the tubers are usually planted outdoors.

If there is a well ventilated, cool, light place, such as a cold frame or cool greenhouse, in which to grow them potatoes can be raised in pots and full sized tubers developed very much earlier than the first crop from the garden.

Ten inch pots will be sufficiently large. Rub off all the eyes except the strongest for pot culture.

MOUNT LASSEN IN VIOLENT ERUPTION

Redding, Cal.—Fire, smoke, steam, volcanic ashes, rocks and deadly gases belched, not only from the crater which opened up near the summit of Mount Lassen May 30, but also from two new craters that burst open more than a mile from the first of the new craters, and the first known toll is one dying, one injured and two de-mmented.

The outbreak of Mount Lassen is extremely volcanic in nature, and the peak becomes the newest active volcano in the world.

Lance Graham was fatally hurt by falling rocks. His head was battered and he was found half covered by ashes and clinders.

Rocks hurled from the spouting volcano and broke the arm and gashed the face of George Tipple, a lumberjack, and left him demented.

George Goodwin, who left Manzanita Lake at 8 o'clock in the morning, was within a half mile of the crater when the eruption occurred, and he also is demented as a result.

Other members of the party near the mountain at the time, report that the top of the mountain has been blown off, and ashes, rock and clinders cover territory two miles from the peak.

Brief News of the Week

English suffragettes staged one of the most dramatic acts of their campaign when they exploded a bomb in Westminster Abbey.

San Francisco's population is 518,365, according to the new city directory. The gain in the past year is estimated at 12,733.

A series of tornadoes swept through South Dakota and caused considerable damage to farm buildings. Heavy rains fell in some sections.

The strike of the 10,000 employees of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing company has spread to the Union Switch & Signal company, says a report from Pittsburgh.

The General Federation of Women's Clubs, in convention at Chicago, went on record as favoring votes for women.

The National Association of Mexican war veterans met for its annual reunion at Chillicothe, O., less than a dozen members being in attendance. The parade was led by a man 90 years old.

The total number of Americans who have registered at the Brazilian legation at Mexico City and declared their intention to remain in Mexico at their own risk is 1271. Only 300 of these persons live outside the capital.

A woman prohibitionist, who wants to get married, has been informed by the secretary of state of California that she must run in the final election for the legislature under the same name she used in the primaries.

Four state banks in Chicago, with aggregate deposits of \$6,411,977, and reported cash means of \$1,434,692, were taken charge of by the state banking department, which closed the bank doors and began examination of the banks' affairs.

With the avowed intent to defeat Senator Smoot for re-election the democratic and progressive state conventions, held separately in Salt Lake, combined on a state ticket, nominating James H. Moyle, of Salt Lake, democrat, for the senate; Frank B. Stephens, of Salt Lake, democrat, for supreme court justice; James H. Mays of Salt Lake, Progressive, and Lewis Larson, of Mantli, progressive, for representatives.
