The Postal Theory Applied to Telephone Rates.

The success of the parcel post appears to have inspired the postoffice department with the notion that there are more worlds to conquer, and Mr. Burleson is said to be impatient with anxiety over the fact that the program of the present session of Congress has at no time included moving the "central offices" from which 10,000,000 telephones are operated into the sanctuaries of his postmasters throughout the country. Congress realizes that with so many wires in the air the undertaking of government ownership of telephones may be a difficult problem to pull across. The postmaster general refers to the telegraph business as being of a "monopolistic nature," and says it is "of vital importance to the people that it be conducted by unselfish interests." Therefore he would acquire all telegraph and telephone lines. As might have been expected one of the first demands upon Washington in anticipation of government ownership has called for an equalizing of rates for telephone service, and it is pointed out that this policy which has been applied to the whole postal system, including the recent acquisition of the parcel post, should relieve New York of its average rate of \$90 a year for business phones and similarly high residence rate, and distribute the burden of the cities throughout the country. Quite naturally telephone users in the big cities would welcome a system by which they could "average up" with the greater portions of the country, where \$2 a month for residence service, and \$3 a month for business phones, is the usual rate. The average rate for all phones in New York is \$50 a year, while the rate for the entire Bell system is \$30.93. Of course New York thinks it is absurd—and so do the people of San Francisco, Seattle, Chicago, and all other cities.

England has been "averaging up" since taking over the telephones, with the result that outside of London residence rentals average \$38.88, while business phones limited to 1300 calls cost \$43.74. London, Liverpool and other metropolitan centers have lower rates in consequence. Independent of the larger issues involved in government ownership there is a good deal of talk among members of congress to the effect that there has already been too much of this sort of business that "equalizes" in favor of the cities at the expense of the rest of the country. And while following the story of rates at home and abroad the student of the question finds that while there are not nearly as many telephones in proportion to population in Europe as in the United States, that there is a good deal more profanity over there because of the inefficient service.

During the past seven months Senator Boise Penrose has been having a delightful time in the state of Pennsylvania, and the news of his progress has been joyfully received by standpat Republicans and has brought woe and consternation to the Progressives. Penrose has developed into a good deal of a progressive republican himself during the past two or three years, and being a very adaptable politician, he early declared in favor of the direct election of the United States Senators. But now Colonel Roosevelt is back from the wilds of South America, and he is regarded as a great big buzzing fly in the Penrose ointment. The Colonel has always been very loyal to his friend Pinchot, and he promises a fight to a finish in the Keystone State in behalf of the former forester. Perhaps in due time the ease of Senator Gallinger, who is a candidate for reelection in New Hampshire, and Uncle Joe Cannon, who aspires to his old seat in congress as a representative from the Danville, Illinois, district, will come up for the especial attention of the chief of the bull moose party. In any event, there has been no intimation that Penrose, Gallinger, or Cannon have been showing

any disposition to join the welcome home to the gentleman from Oyster Bay.

Washington's Relation to Things.

The national capital has been enjoying the delights of early summer, and the breezes have whisked through the "executive tent," in the rear of the White House, where the president of 100,000,000 people transacts the affairs of government, just as though there was nothing unusual about this habit, which for the most part has been heretofore indulged in by only the military branch of our government. Washington politicians are beginning to think a good deal about the elections that are coming along in a few months, and the proud gentlemen who whisk about in their automobiles and live in swell hotels where the high cost of living figures out about as much for a single dinner as a week's board in a local hotel in the interior of the country, are contemplating laying aside the silk hats and dress suits, preparatory to going into store clothes and fedora hats, which are more in favor among the "dear people" as election day approaches. There is something very pleasant about this job of being a congressman, and while it may not return

as much revenue as the more wealthy men get out of private life, yet being a congressman is about as near heaven as a great many politicians ever expect to get, and therefore reelection is very much desired by the gentlemen now in the saddle.

The Anti-Trust Bills.

The house of representatives has of late years been able to keep the senate hopper well filled, and now it is passing on to an unwilling senate an interstate trade commission bill along with the other two trust bills that have the approval of the administration. The main Clayton trust bill prohibits interlocking directorates, regulates holding companies, and restricts immense monopolistic commercial practices. The interstate trade commission bill is in effect an enlargement of the already established bureau of corporations, which is a part of the department of commerce. With the enlargement of this bureau it will become one of the greatest investigating branches of government that we have, and matters of tariff, including cause and effect, as well as business practices throughout the entire country, are to be comprehensively investigated.

Panama Tolls and Colombia.

Perhaps the public may know, after having digested all these debates concerning the Panama Canal tolls, whether or not it is a fact that the United States is truckling to England. They may also have discovered the condition of Uncle Sam's national honor, and learned whether it has been kept unsullied. While the Panama Canal matter may have stirred up lots of feeling throughout the country, and have aroused all sorts of sentiment, yet those who allow themselves to be carried far afield, threaten to balk at the ratification of the treaty with Colombia, carrying with it reimbursement to the tune of \$25,000,000. A part of congress is very sure that we should make the "amende honorable" to Colombia, and send along a draft on the United States treasury, while the opposite viewpoint is that Uncle Sam is being blackmailed. It is plain that there is going to be a beautiful racket before this treaty comes out of the senate of the United States.

Zentaro Kawase, professor of forestry at the imperial university of Tokio, Japan, has been making a tour of the national forests of this country to learn the government's methods of selling timber and of reforestation.

KURIOS FROM KORRESPONDENTS

Q. What is a henny cock? A. A male bird feathered like a hen.
Q. I have been advised to secure ferrets to rid my premises of rats. Do they catch chickens. A. Yes. They belong to the weasel family—the chicken fiends.

Q. My brooder ducklings last season had weak bills and rheumatism. Their bills would bend. What was the trouble? A. You kept your brooder too hot and didn't let them out in the air and on the ground soon enough. Don't mollycoddle ducklings.

Q. I have been using the — brooder, and my chicks seem listless in the morning. They are fine when they come from the incubator, and then the trouble begins. Why is this? A. Your brooder has unnatural bottom heat. The lamp throws soot and smoke fumes up into the hover, and the chicks breathe the deadly air.

Q. Please state difference between cholera and roup microbes. A. Cholera germ flourishes in hot season, roup in cold. Cholera germ attacks digestive system, roup the respiratory organs. Little similarity between the two except that bughouse methods promote both.

Q. Why is corn not a good summer grain? Why do so many egg fanciers criticize corn? A. Corn is too heating for summer and should be only fed then in a mixed ration. Egg producers do not feed corn heavy because it is too fattening, and much fat means few eggs.

Chicken in Dakota if a thief steals one chicken it is called petit larceny, but if

he gets away with more it is called grand larceny. This is certainly a difference with a vengeance.

Among the varieties to be admitted to the revised standard is the Single Comb Red Pyle Leghorn. This will be the ninth variety of Leghorns, and it's a dandy, like the rest of them.

London game buyers have been warned that many of the partridges and pheasants shipped there from China are killed in wood and field by poisoned bait. American egg buyers are hereby warned that thousands of Chinese eggs are being shipped to this country and these antique, germ laden, yellow perils are likely to be sold as the real American article.

At the eighteenth exhibition of the Boston Poultry association there were over 5,000 entries. The association invited the "old guard" and seventeen veteran poultrymen responded. The oldest was eighty-two years, H. B. Mason. The next oldest was L. K. Felch, eighty years of age. Mr. Felch recently issued his sixty-first annual catalogue. These old veterans started the ball rolling, and much of the success of modern poultry is due to their early efforts.

Poultry health and hygiene seem to have been omitted from most of our agricultural college curriculums, but they certainly are as important as the production and sale of market poultry and eggs, if not more so.

The South Dakota state branch of the American Poultry association recently prosecuted a chicken thief for stealing \$20 worth of poultry and had him sent to the penitentiary for eighteen months.

While fresh home eggs in Seattle were selling at 40 cents and cheaper grades in Petaluma, Cal., at 38 cents Chinese eggs butted in and sold at 29 cents.

Broken glass is a poor substitute for grit and often cuts the crop and pierces the gizzard. When you do find any in the gizzard of a fowl that is uninjured by it the glass is worn smooth as a button and no good for grit.

The first man to make and use an incubator was ridiculed and considered a sort of lunatic. Now the fellow who tries to run a plant without one is called an old fossil and thought to be lacking practical gray matter.

It doesn't require much room for bantams, and they certainly are interesting pets to have around and fine layers too. Pickle hard boiled bantam eggs and small red beets in vinegar and you have a good appetizer for that picnic lunch.

Ducks are always on the go, and one wonders when they sleep. This everlasting waddling, wigglings, quacking, splashing and digging with their scoop shovels is necessary to their digestion and enables them to get away with bushels of grub in short order.
