State of Mo., Co. of Pike. To Whom it may concern:

The undersigned will Tuesday, Sept. 29 A. D., 1846, sell at public outcry, for cash, on premises, where Coon Creek crosses the Missouri road, the following chattels: 9 yoke of oxen and chains; 2 wagons with beds; three nigger wenchies; 4 buck niggers; 3 nigger boys; 2 prairie plow; 25 steel traps; 1 barrel pickled cabbage; 1 hoghead tobacco; 1 lot nigger hoes; spinning wheel; loom; 3 fox hounds; a lot of coon, mink and skunk skins and a lot of other articles.
