COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

July 13, 1914.—Ordinance No. 408, for the extension of a storm sewer on North Douglas Street on the east side of the railroad track north to the north line of Villard Place, was read first, second and third times and passed.

On motion the water committee was instructed to employ an electrician to examine the fire alarm system and ascertain why the bell will not ring, and repair same, or, if it can not be repaired, to notify the company which sold it.

Moved that the engineer prepare a plat for the opening of Columbia Court to East Main Street from Villard Place, and that the recorder communicate with H. D. Larson of Oregon City and ask him to name the minimum consideration for the amount of land necessary to open the street.

On motion the recorder was instructed to divide the city's advertising between The Sentinel and The Leader provided the price per line be not greater than the present contract with The Sentinel, and that the city discontinue paying for the publication of the council proceedings.

On motion the fire chief was instructed to order the necessary attachments for the fire apparatus.

On motion the water commissioner was instructed not to change the flat water rate for the Brown Lumber Co. Meeting adjourned.
