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PRESBYTERIANS AGAIN VICTORS IN BALL GAME

Fourth Game Between Rival Church Teams Result in Score of 1 to 0 in Favor of Calvinites, Who Are Champions for Time Being.

Lord Seems to Be on Side of Winners

Victors Put Only One Ball Into Outfield—Lonely Score Is Recorded in Inning in Which Three Errors Were Chalked Against Opponents.

In a real, regular ball game Friday night, and the best played this season by has-beens and come-backs, the Presbyterians won from the Methodists by a score of 1 to 0. The Lord seemed to favor the winners upon several occasions and they are the champions for the time being in the church league series.

At the end of the second inning not a man had reached second base and only one had secured temporary lodging at first. In the third inning the Methodists succeeded in getting the third sack decorated and for a few minutes it looked like a certain score. The Presbyterians also got a tally-maker started around the bases, but the score was stopped by a caught fly.

The lonely tally was recorded in the fifth inning when a grounder got through short stop, a pretty infield fly was muffed and a passed ball at home plate allowed a man on third to complete the circuit.

In the last inning the Methodists filled the sacks, and with one down and Sluggo Mackin to bat the Methodist rooters were calling it a 2 to 1 game. The performance of the famous Casey caused not a pang of sorrow compared to the gloom which fell when Mackin put an easy one in the hands of the first.

Cottage Grove Electric Co. May Be Left Out in the Cold

City Council Accepts Electric Lighting Proposal Submitted by Rival Company and Calls Special Election for August 20 to Vote Upon Franchise.—Cheaper Lights Certain for City and Consumers.

As the result of action taken by the city council last night this city will have a second electric lighting company providing a franchise is voted by the people at the special election called for August 20.

By the accepting of the bid for lighting the city submitted by O. L. Nichols the Cottage Grove Electric Co., whose contract expires January 1, is left out in the cold unless the people should fail to vote a franchise, in which case the whole proposition would be up in the air again.

Bids were received Monday night, at which time Mr. Nichols submitted a bid much lower than that submitted by the other company. Action was postponed until last night, when the Cottage Grove Electric Co., claiming to have secured information concerning supplies that it did not have when making first bid, made a second proposition for a three-

year contract. Mr. Nichols offered to withdraw his proposition if the Cottage Grove Electric Co. would put its proposition into writing, but this action was ruled out of order, and was not considered.

It is probable that there would have been no competitive bid against the present company had it not insisted upon being given a ten-year contract, while the council remained firm in its determination not to give a contract for more than five years. The second proposition submitted by the electric company indicates that even if a franchise should not be voted the company which Mr. Nichols represents, the city is to have greatly reduced rates.

The single item of charges for 600 candle power series are lamps will show the comparative differences in the bids. The Cottage Grove Electric Co. asked (Continued on page 2.)

BABIES MUST BE ENTERED BEFORE SEPT. 12

Parents Must Accompany Eugenic Contestants, but Will Be Admitted Free.

Teams and Labor Will Be Donated in Hauling Wood to Complete Payment on Team for Man Badly Crippled in Recent Accident.

Cottage Grove people will tomorrow demonstrate their sympathy for those in distress when the time of men and teams will be donated to complete a wood contract for Max Dorward, who was badly crippled in the accident that resulted in the death of his five-year-old son last Wednesday.

The contract was for furnishing wood to D. Sterling as final payment on a team of horses purchased from Mr. Sterling. There are about 135 cords yet to haul.

Wives of the men who will do the work will arrange a picnic dinner for the men.

A few more men and men with teams can be used. Lee Roy Woods and H. F. Oakes have the work in charge.

FIRING TREES ONLY METHOD TO KILL PEAR BLIGHT

Horticultural Commissioner Endorses Drastic Action Taken by Fruit Inspector Stewart to Free Cottage Grove Orchards of the Disease.

The work of Fruit Inspector Stewart in taking summary measures to eradicate the pear blight, which had infested a couple orchards of this vicinity, were highly commended by C. A. Park, horticultural commissioner of this district, who was in the city Monday.

Mr. Park stated that the disease is probably the most dangerous known and if allowed to get beyond control it is almost impossible to prevent the destruction of all orchards. He told of instances in California where every tree in large valleys had been completely destroyed by its ravages. He has no fear that any such result will occur here but said that the immediate burning of affected trees is the only safe method in which to handle it.

TYLER STREET BRIDGE IS UNDER WAY

Work was begun Monday on the new bridge across the Coast Fork at Tyler Street. The timbers were delivered Friday and Saturday and the crew put to work Monday. George Lea has the contract and expects to have the bridge completed in three or four weeks.

HORSE IS SERIOUSLY HURT IN ACCIDENT

George Boyd may lose a valuable horse as the result of an accident Sunday evening. If the horse should recover from its injuries it will probably be permanently crippled.

The accident occurred a short distance east of the city. Mr. Boyd was returning home from the city and an automobile was coming towards the city. Mr. Boyd drove to the side of the road but it appearing that the machine was going to give none of the road he drove so far onto the incline that the buggy tipped over. Mr. Boyd had little opportunity to observe who was in the machine, but states that he thought it was Ernest Lockwood and Fate Long. These men state that they came over the road that evening but that they saw no horse and buggy.

It is more than likely that whoever was driving the car, the horse and buggy was not noticed. The fact that no effort was made to give part of the road bears out this theory. As the horse is a light colored one, Mr. Boyd does not understand how anyone could have passed without seeing it. The horse's leg was broken.

Flat Car Burns.

A flat car belonging to the Oregon Pacific & Eastern Railway was completely destroyed by fire Friday night at the U. S. Logging Co.'s camp in the reserve. A second car was also partly burned as was also the sled supporting a donkey engine. The fire is supposed to have started from a spark blown from a smoldering snag.

SON KILLED AND FATHER INJURED AT SAME TIME

Five-Year-Old Franklin Dorward Meets Horrible Death in Accident That Would Have Ordinarily Meant But Few Slight Bruises.

Family Had Returned From Sunday School Picnic

Loaded Wood Wagon Strikes Snag and Throws Boy Under Front Wheel and Man Under Rear Wheel.—Latter's Leg Is Crushed.

Thrown under the wheels of a wagon loaded with wood and the top of his head crushed in, five-year-old Franklin Dorward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Dorward, met almost instant death last Wednesday night at about 8 o'clock. The father suffered a severely crushed leg in the same accident.

The family had attended the Christian Church Sunday School picnic. After returning home Mr. Dorward and two boys went to the woods for a load of wood. In returning with the loaded wagon a snag was struck that threw Mr. Dorward and the boy from the wagon with the result already stated.

The other boy had run ahead of the wagon. He summoned his mother and other assistance. The injured boy had died before the mother arrived.

It is not certain yet whether the father's leg can be saved from amputation.

Funeral services for the little boy were held Saturday, interment being made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Brown Mill Resumes.

The Brown mill resumed operations Tuesday, resumption having been delayed a day by the burning of a couple cars in the woods. About 65 men are employed at the mill and in the woods.

The Vesuvius camp, which was reached in time for dinner, is nearly 5,000 feet above Cottage Grove.

Members of the party were enthusiastic about the beautiful scenery, declaring it even better than that of the far-famed McKenzie.

It was at first thought that this was the first car to penetrate so far into the Bohemia district, but it has since been learned that Foster Phillips drove in a Buick about five years ago. Since then several machines have tried to make the trip and given it up.
