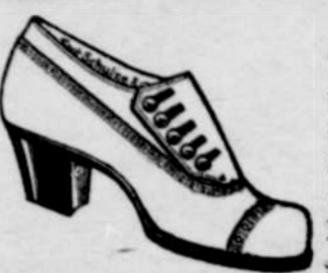

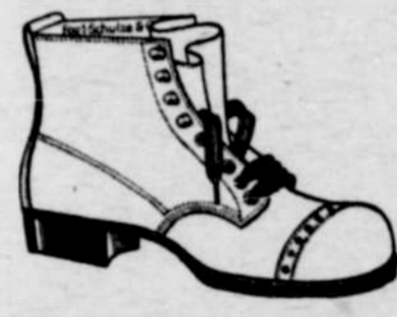

\$65 per year on its five-year contract for each are light, minimum of sixty to be installed, while the Nichols bid made a price of \$55 on the same light, with no minimum number named. Under the present contract the city pays \$80 each year for each are light of 6 amperes or the equivalent of 400 candle power.

The Nichols contract offered a rate of 12 1/2 cents per kilowatt to private consumers for the first 25000 and 6 cents for each kilowatt above that. A special rate of 3 cents per kilowatt hour for heating and power current is offered by the Nichols contract, the current to go in over a separate meter installed without charge by the company. Fifteen cents per kilowatt is the present meter rate charged the private consumer.

Cottage Grove like many other cities throughout the state, has a curfew law, but the most conscientious officers can be outwitted by boys and girls determined to violate it if the officers are not assisted by the parents of the children.

W. P. Woodard, president of the society, says that the importance of the children being at home in the evenings, or with their parents, can not be overstated, as it is at night that the greater part of the mischief which the society is trying so hard to exterminate is done.
