SUMMER LINGERIE

Embroideries Used In Its Embellishment This Season.

FINE, SOFT BATISTE FEATURED

Flounces and Beadings Are Useful In Fashioning Underwear and In Adorning Children's Wash Dresses—Some Patterns That Imitate Laces.

Machine made embroideries are unusually attractive this season. They may be had in plain white or in white and colors. The colored embroideries are especially useful in the making of children's summer garments. The embroidered flounce which forms the skirt of many of the long waisted juvenile garments very materially reduces the amount of work to be done in making it. When the dress is a plain one the embroidered beadings are used to define the belt line, and through these the ribbon which forms the sash is passed. The embroideries are invaluable in the making of lingerie. There are so many patterns that the style may be indefinitely varied. Some of the em-

broideries are as fine as lace. Corset covers may be fashioned of one piece from the deep embroidered flounces.

Batiste—soft, fine batiste—is the feature of the summer lingerie. The batiste is mostly a pink or a soft shell pink. Pink underclothes have been held over from last season, and we are still bathed in those roseate rays.

Wonderfully filmy and fairylike are some of the new batiste things. Fancy, for instance, a rose colored nightgown trimmed with fishnet lace and with a garland of flowers defining the empire waist or an envelope chemise of the same soft tint touched here and there with dainty valenciennes. Even crepe de chine is not quite so wonderfully soft, exquisite and pliable.

There is a strange tendency for lingerie to follow the call of the outer garment, and it is quite amusing to see how much negligees, skirts and chemises are impressed by the dogma of skirt and tunic.

There, for instance, is a chemise—and a very popular one this season—which slants up in front for all the world like the modish tunic. In the case of charming lace trimmed knickerbockers this is, by the way, a very appreciable coquetry.

All undergarments now show the side gash. Drawers are cut away above the knees, and, as for petticoats, these yield to the requirements of the tango dip. One model, for instance, is in reality nothing but two aprons, rounded up at the edge almost to the knees and laced to the hips with ribbon.

The beadings illustrated here are among the new patterns useful for both lingerie and children's garments. Eyelet embroidery is favored, and some of the patterns are imitations of lace designs.

Summer Hatbox.

The picture hat is the bane of the young woman invited to spend the week end in the country, because she does not wish to load herself down with hatboxes innumerable.

To meet this need there has been built what might be described as a dress suit case with bulging sides. Inside it is divided through the center by a flap, on each side of which is a cone of spiral wire, on which a picture hat can be fastened with hatpins.

If only one hat is to be carried the other side of the hat case will accommodate a couple of fresh shirt waists or the innumerable small things for which there never seems room in the steamer trunk, popular for week end or short stays in the country.

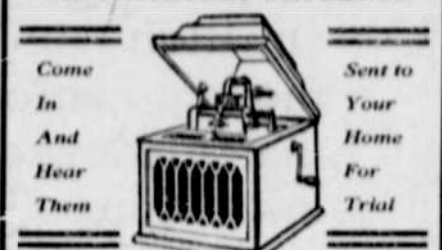
Putting Linen Away.

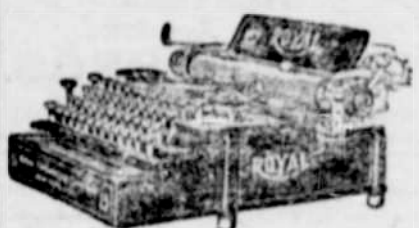
