Single Tax in Disguise

EDITORIAL IN THE TAX LIBERATOR

Complete single tax is not an issue in Oregon at this time. It has twice been submitted to the voters of the state and each time has been overwhelmingly defeated. However, as the \$1500 exemption bill, which will appear on the Ballot, is submitted by the single taxers, and is, as a matter of fact, single tax in disguise, it is altogether proper that the Liberator should concern itself with the fundamental principles of single tax. The same arguments which apply to single tax apply to the \$1500 exemption bill.

In considering single tax we first must understand that there are two kinds of single tax; first, complete single tax, and second, what is known as single tax limited. Complete single tax has for its purpose communal ownership in land; that is, no private property in land. It is the complete single taxer's belief that the land we live upon should belong to all the people, the same as the air we breathe, and the water we drink. In other words, that all the natural resources of the country belong to all the people and ownership in them should not be vested in any individual, but that land should be held in common by all the community. That is to say, government ownership of all land.

In submitting single tax they do not come out openly and say that they wish to confiscate property. They say, however, that they wish to take to the state all the economic rent from land. Or to express this differently, let us quote from the April, 1914, number of The Single Tax Review. In this we find the following:

"Single tax is an instrument for effecting the resumption of social wealth for social needs—not merely for the needs of government as now administered, but going beyond it, if necessary, in order to take all the land value. It therefore, has nothing in common with 'Single Tax Limited,' SAVE AS POLITICAL STEPS TOWARD THE ULTIMATE GOAL."

The \$1500 exemption bill is single tax limited, and is therefore a political step toward the ultimate goal of complete single tax, and the latter means just this, that whether you own a home in the city, a farm in the country, or a business block in the city, you must pay to the state all of its earning power. Now, remember, they do not want so much of the income from the property as is necessary to run the various departments of our government, but they want all of the income from the property. Now, we all know that the value of anything is its capitalized income. That is to say, if you own a building which is paying you in rentals \$100 a month, then the value of that building is the amount of money which at the prevailing rates of interest will amount to \$100 per month. If you have a business and a person should come to you and say, "Now you keep your business but give me the income from it," you would immediately realize that you would have nothing of value left. Now that is exactly what the complete single taxer advocates. By taxing all of the earning power from land he confiscates the value of your land.

Complete single tax will never be adopted in Oregon. It would be useless for the single taxer to submit a measure to the voters of the state of Oregon which would result in every owner, every farmer, every person who owns land, losing their land and having it become a part of the property of the state of Oregon. In other words, it would result in all of us renting our homes from the state, rather than our owning them.

The Liberator does not need to argue against complete single tax. Complete single tax is not a taxing system. It is a Socialist idea which will result in government ownership of all land. If Socialism is right, then complete single tax is right, but as there are but few people in Oregon who are Socialists, but few of us believe in complete single tax.

Now single tax is advocated as a system of taxation, and we must therefore so consider it. Single tax limited ("a political step toward the goal of complete single tax") has for its purpose the raising of our public revenues from land only. In other words those who believe in single tax limited believe that all the revenue from government expense should be raised from land alone. It is not their idea to go at once the full limit of the complete single taxer and have government ownership of all land, but they offer single tax limited as a taxing system. That is to say, they wish at this time to take so much out of the income from land as is necessary to defray the expenses of the government. It is this form of single tax which the Liberator wishes to discuss.

It is our belief that 99 people out of a hundred who have endorsed the single tax limited theory have done so because they believe that there are two effects which will come from single tax limited. First, that it will encourage the improvement of land, and secondly, that it does not penalize industry. To express this differently, they believe that by taking the tax off of improvements on land that it will encourage people to build more improvements, more houses, more business blocks. Those who believe in single tax limited also maintain that under our present system the man who will not improve his property is benefited by the man who does improve his property. Both of these arguments are fallacious. In the September issue of The Liberator will appear a discussion as to the effect which the exemption of improvements from taxes will have upon stimulating building. In the October issue of The Liberator will appear an expose of the fallacy of the argument that by erecting a number of improvements in a city the value of the vacant property in the city is increased.

The editorial staff of The Liberator will welcome any communications regarding single tax and we hope that single taxers and others will criticize the articles which are written. We are entirely honest in our views on single tax and we believe that our single tax friends are just as sincere. We are convinced of the fact that they are wrong in their conclusions, but we shall be glad to give their views just as much prominence as our own, and will be entirely fair in all arguments for or against single tax which may be offered.

GAME WARDEN IS HOT AFTER LAW VIOLATORS

Disguising of Sex of Deer, Fish Dynamiting and Shooting of Birds, Is Charged.

Frequent violations of the section of the game law which prohibits the mutilation of the hides or carcasses in a manner to disguise the sex of deer killed by hunters, are reported by E. C. Hills, deputy state game warden, who returned last night from a week's circuit of the country. The law makes it unlawful to have in one's possession an animal so mutilated that the sex cannot be distinguished, and penalizes it with a fine of from \$25 to \$500 or from 30 days' to six months' imprisonment. The purpose of the law is to further protect female deer, which cannot be killed.

Hills left Eugene August 3 for points on the Siuslaw to investigate charges of violation of the game law, returned and left immediately for the McKenzie where there are reports of the dynamiting of fish. Recently many fish have been swimming into the racks at the hatchery and dying from the effects of dynamite explosions. An effort is being made to locate the offenders.

Hills also reports wholesale violations of the game laws in reference to birds. The farmers, he says, are guilty to a certain extent, but he says that he has reports of the shooting of pheasants and game birds by motorists from motor cars and even motorcycles.

To stop this he is deputizing residents in all parts of the county and expects many arrests to follow. The violation of the bird laws is probably encouraged by the fact that the birds are very plentiful everywhere. They are flying up along all the county roads and it is very

easy for persons with guns to shoot them without detection under ordinary conditions. Hills has not revealed the identity of his deputies.—Guard.

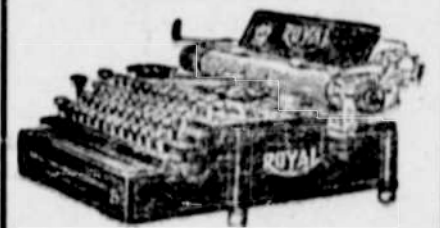
